



GIFTS MADE OF LINEN.

Very Desirable Articles Can Be Made of This Material and We Give Description of Three.


Linen will be popular this year for homemade Christmas gifts. One advantage it has over the dainty silks is that it may be many times laundered and will still look as fresh and good as when new. The three illustrations here presented were taken from articleo in



A DAINTY WORK BAG.



The dainty work bag is easily made from a circle of linen 19 inches in diameter, the edge bound

For the pincushion, cut two hearts of linen, about a half inch larger, all around, than your heart-shaped foundation. Bind each edge separately. Embroider a little forget-me-not design on the upper side and fasten the two sides together by means of baby ribbon run through eyelets, which need not necessarily be worked. This same idea may be used for making a sachet. The sponge case is made to cover a case of oiled silk for carrying a sponge or wash cloth when traveling. It measures nine by six and a half inches, is bound like the other articles described about the edge and the cover flap is embroidered to suit the fancy.

HOW TO USE BIRCH BARK

Strips of Leather Recommended for Joining Pieces Together and Indian Decoration Approved.

The shops this month are showing all sorts of pretty things made of birch bark, most of which could be readily copied by the girl who has brought home a supply of birch bark from her summer vacation.

The little bonbon boxes which we used to make by lacing together five pieces of the bark with ribbon have developed into a good-sized workbox. in much the same way, but fitted with e lid.

The sides are formed of four pieces seven by four inches. The top and bottom are seven by seven inches. The edges of the bark are bound with sweet grass held in place by overcasting with colored floss. Join together with narrow ribbon, which can be drawn through with a needle and tied in bows. Have the ribbon of the same shade as the floss used in overcasting.

The popular pig penwiper is very striking when made from birch bark. For it you will require a strip measin a narrow white uring four by six inches. Cut the pattern of the pig from paper first, and then laying this pattern on the bark, cut the latter by it. Eyes, cars, nose and curly tail are added with a brushful of sepia water color. Several thicknesses of chamois cut to the same shape are used for the wiper. The words "Fresh from ter of what is to be the Pen" are emblazoned on piggy's surface.

> All sorts of cute little catch-alls, hairpin holders and dead match receivers can be fashioned with a little ingenuity from the bark. If not sufficiently pliable soak it in water over night.

There are many ways of decorating it attractively. Indian designs or what pass as such, applied with a camel's hair Brush dipped in walnut juice, are effective. For novelty's sake, too, strips of leather (old gloves will do for this) can replace ribbon in binding the bark if care is used. Or loops and strings for hanging the articles up can be of the leather. Bead fringes and other bead ornamentations, bestowing as they do a characteristic Indian touch, are delight ful.



How to Make This Article and Directions for Padding and Dec- ' orating It.

A FINE FIREWOOD BOX.

It is not a difficult matter to make many useful objects that will be very acceptable as presents, and for those who would like a suggestion an idea is illustrated here that any 'smart boy could follow.

The design for a firewood box may appear a difficult matter to make, but it is in reality quite a simple affair to construct and decorate, as shown in the

drawing, and is not beyond the ability of any smart boy to make.

Of tongued and grooved boards make a box 36 inches long, 16 inches wide and 18 inches high, with the bottom fastened three inches above the lower edge of the sides and ends.

A cover should be made to extend over the ends and front three-quarters of an inch, and at the rear edge it is to be attached to the box with two strong sheetiron or brass hinges.

With a compass-saw cut the bottom of the front and ends, as shown, and then treat the wood to several good coats of paint or varnish, after which the four corners can be bound with thin sheet iron and large oval-headed upholsterers' tacks driven two inches apart. Sheet lead can be substituted for the iron. At the top, sides and ends panels may be formed of figured upholstery goods or leather, and to give them the padded effect they may be lined with curled hair, a few layers of cotton batting or some fine excelsior. To finish the edges nicely leather or mohair gimp should be caught down with large headed tacks, and they may be placed an even distance apart, as shown in the illustration.

A division in the box will make it a convenient receptacle for both coal and wood for an open or grate fire.





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


DAINTIEST OF APRONS.

Have any of our readers ever seen the pretty aprons made of handkerchiefs? It is a gift that will delight your friends. To make this pretty and useful gift two embroidered handkerchiefs. or two gentleman's initial silk handkerchiefs, one yard of hamburg insertion, three yards of one-inch ribbon, four yards of baby ribbon and three years of valenciennes lace are required.

Cut one of the handkerchiefs into four parts diagonally and join to the other

with the valenciennes insertion. The outside edge is then shaped to give the rounded effect, edged with valenciennes insertion, run with baby ribbon and valenciennes lace. Sketch No. 1 represents a wooden scrap basket, two side pieces of which



each 14 inches high, eight inches wids at the bottom and 11 inches wide at the top. These sides are screwed together and the bottom board is fitted in. The whole is finished with burnt umber water color, the same as the book rack, and the design is painted on in yellow, blue, white and black. You will find the side pieces of a discarded soap or starch box are each 14 inches high, nine inches wide at the bottom and 12 inches wide at the top. The other two side pieces are

just the desired thickness and of sufficient length and width.

The dog or cat bassinet is made of soap box, the use of which will save us all carpentry work except the sawing of the top outlines, the holes in the end pieces of the coal or wood box and the sandpapering. The vigorous application of sandpaper, wrapped around a block of wood or cork, will soon obliterate the stenciled matter and stains on the boxes. The designs may be painted on as in the case of the scrap basket.

A NOVEL PINCUSHION.

It Is a Linen Embroidered Mound That Sets Down Snug in a Pretty China Bowl.

For a novel pinchushion select a pretty china bowl three or four inches in




diameter. Cut out a circular piece of cardboard that will exactly fit the bowl an inch below the rim. Pile upon it strands of wool or

Obtain some boards six inches wide and three-quarters or seven-eighths of an inch in thickness, planed on both sides. Of them construct a box from six to eight inches wide, six inches high, and long enough to fill the window sill it may rest on.

The corners and bottoms must be securely fastened with screws, and the inside of the box can be lined with zinc to protect the wood from moisture in the earth it contains, as otherwise the dampness would cause the board to



A WINDOW BOX. swell and warp so as to spring the box loose at the joints. The outside and top edges of the box can be painted a light. pleasing shade, and two or three coats will be sufficient to give it a good appearance. The inside should be coated with black asphaltum varnish, that forms a waterproof coating, and if moisture should come in contact with the wood it will not be as liable to warp as if ordinary thin paint was applied.

The design on the front of the box is to be outlined with oval-headed brass upholsterers' tacks one-quarter or three-eighths of an inch in diameter.

When the last coat of paint is thoroughly dry the tacks can be driven on the surface, and to arrange them in an even and uniform manner a line describing the design should be followed.

On a piece of thin brown paper the size of the box front draw with a soft lead pencil the illustrated design and pin the paper to the front of the box.


SOME DOLL FURNITURE.

Come along, boys and girls! Let's play carpenter shop. The things we make may be useful as Christmas presents for our brothers and sisters and friends.

First we will hunt up the tool' chest and obtain a hammer, a plane, a saw, a bit-stock or brace, a boring bit onequarter inch, another bit seven-sixteenths inch in diameter and a gimlet. Now that we have the tools we will continue our search until we find two empty soap boxes, and if we do not succeed in finding them at home our friend the grocer will give them to us. Mamma will tell us where the bottle of fish glue or stratina is, and after we have placed all these things together we shall put on our hats and walk around to the hardware shop, where we must purchase 18 No. 4 and 18 No. 7 dowels, which will cost us 25 or 30 cents.

These dowels, you see, are fine round sticks of wood one yard long, the No. 7





Drive a tack in the board and with a piece of string attached you will find it a very simple job. Here is some work for another girl. One of the boys may plane off one of the side boards of a box, and on that you may mark out the top rail of the work basket, using a tack and a piece of string. Mark four pieces. as shown in the diagram, below each one, an inch more than a quarter of the circle, so that after they have been sawed out they can be joined together with fish glue and tacks, as shown in the sectional view within the circle. You may next saw out the bottom board which has been marked and then bore 28 holes with the smaller bit in the bottom board and 28 in the rim or top rail. boring them somewhat slantingly, as the top rail is one inch greater in diameter than the bottom board. All we need do now, children, is to saw some of the No. 4 dowels into 28 pieces each five inches long and insert them into the holes we have bored, and, after we see that the whole fits together, apply the stratina and glue the basket together. 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



SOME STRANGE FOODS.

Rattlesnakes and Skunk Meat Said To Be Good.

That civilized man has missed some of the most toothsome dainties goes without saying, and it is evident that prejudice enters largely into this. Thus, in California, the best fish, it is said, is the sculpin, but in the East this fish goes begging on account of its disagreeable appear ance. In Arizona, Indian children may be seen catching ants and eating them, and in Mexico the honey ant is eagerly sought after by the natives, who eat the well-rounded, current like abdomen. In South America the large lizard, the iguana. is a delicacy, not to speak of the larger snakes, which in taste are like chicken. The ordinary rattlesnake, it is said, is excellent eating if one can overcome the inborn prejudice. Americans are inclined to regard the Chinese as a

race of rat eaters and denounce the animal as unclean, at the same time consuming tons yearly of the most loathsome of all animals-the hog. The rat is careful of its toilet, cleaning itself constantly, but the hog is the only animal of so-called intelligence that revels in filth and prefers it to cleanliness. The common skunk, owing to its peculiar and of fensive glands, will never be popular as food, yet its flesh is not only good. but delicious, according to various

connoisseurs who have eaten it. That insects do not enter more into the food supplies of nations is due Christmas Boxes to prejudice. Grasshoppers are eaten by some Western tribes. Ground up they make a meal that is said to be most nourishing and aggreeable. Many a white man has pressed through a country, believing himself nearly starving as large game was not to be had, when worms and various insects were at hand, During the flight of locusts Indians sometimes collect them in bags, wash them and cook silver and gold trimmed. them for a meal. The most singular food, in all probability, is the larvae of a fly, common in certain portions of California, and known as Ephy dra. This insect is found in such vast quantities in Lake Mono. Cal., that it is washed upon the shores in vast windows and can be collected in bushels. The water of Mono is singular, seemingly very heavy and smooth like oil; so much so that it resists ordinary wind and refuses to become ruffled. When the larvae begin to appear the Indians gather from far and near and scrape them up, place the worm-like' creatures on them, when they are beaten up and husked, looking then like rice. The Indians call the food koochah-bee, and many bushels are collected at this time; that larvae is nutritious is shown by the condition of the Iodians, who soon grow fat on 'the rich the singular food. 

CARDBOARD DOLL HOUSE.

Full Directions About Making the Home and the Furniture to Put Therein.

The dolls should be made all sizes and dressed in all colors. The skirt is what they stand on. A Dinah can be made of black cloth, mark face with red thread, dress in gay skirt and sew a turban on head. Then pin baby in arms and one or two small dolls to skirt. containing ducklings ready to be hatched. Shark fins-a tough, disagreeable food-are in demand, while deer horns in the velvet and lizards of various kinds are eaten.

The nest of the swallow, with its bedded secretion of the mouth glands of the birds, is nearly worth its weight in gold. Trepang, the tough, impossible holothurian, is exten, and its collection is an important industry along the Malay coast, valued at at least \$100,000 per annum. In France the sea anemone is used as food; stuffed like peppers and boiled it calls to mind crab or crasfish. The echini of various species is also used, cooked in the shell, like an egg, and eaten with a spoon. In nearly all of the old countries of Europe of the type of Spain and Italy the poor are so poor that everything in the nature of food is utilized.

Absolutely nothing is wasted, and meat is rare. The surprise of an Italian fisherman, who landed in Calfornia after a trip around the Horn, 1s better imagined than described. He was amazed, not at the country, but at the abundance of food. He found his countrymen eating meat twice, perhaps three times a day, when he rarely had it once a month. 
