For some time past and at present, ne seems to be all creamery without any particle knowledge of the business, as the prices published in a recent issue of the Acorn, are considerable higher, than the prices actually paid. At a recent meeting of our Creamery Co., the secretary read a re-

port covering the last six months of last year, and I understood him to say that the prices paid for both during that time was 172 cents per pound this seems a trifle low to me and I thought perhaps he might have made a slight mistake, but 171 is the figure he gave. For the same months the editor gives the prices at 21<sub>1</sub>c. For May, he gives the price at 21, for June 19<sub>1</sub>c. I had some milk in the creamery during those months, and I received for May 18, for June 161. think Mr. Beesham paid me the ruling prices, this accounts for 8 months, the other 4 are likely off about the same. The Niles and Buchanan reports may be correct as intended. I am a Michigan man now, and don't like to boast on outside institutions to the detriment of our own. 1 collected some Wisconsin statements to show what was being done over there with a good creamery and a good butter pound. maker, this was done for our mutual benefit and for no other purpose. I have a little creamery stock, so has my neighbor. I don't want to hurt myself neither do I wish to injure my neighbor. I have nothing against the Three Oaks business men, that hold creamery stock, and I think him generous enough to give me an opportunity to protect myself. About 24 years ago I became dissatisfied with 84c per 100 pounds for milk, when the Wisconsin creameries were paying about \$1.10. I never blamed anybody, only Henry L. Hess, and the butter maker. The business was running a little rotten in those days, so I gave it a little airing. Business men and farmers generally say that the airing has been very beneficial, but it caused some unpleasantness. A proper investigation at the time, would have placed me in the right, and the fault would have fallen on whom it belonged, as it is a few good people that do not quite agree with me as the circumstances are not correctly understood by them. You know that a bottle of whiskey with the cork out will always find talkers. Before Mr. Beeson became secretary, I had made arrangements to ship milk, consequently have had but little to do with the creamery since. I think he is doing all he can for the farmers, and conducting his part honestly. After Mr. Beeson was elected. 




