

Reference For Direct Nominations.

Republicans Will Then Determine Whether the Primary Election Law Shall Be Put in Force in Berrien County This Year.

On June 12, next, the republicans of Berrien county will decide by ballot whether they will nominate the candidates for the county officers by the old convention system or by primary election. The voters of the second representative district will likewise decide whether they will nominate the candidate for the legislature by convention or by the primary method.

There is no alternative than to have the question decided by a vote of the republicans. At the spring election the Berrien County Primary Election league had petitions at the various polling places in the county and the voters signed the petition in large numbers. In order to make a vote on the adoption-of the primary law for this county obligatory 1,200 republican signatures to the petition were needed. Republicans Signify Their Attempt to Collect Wolf Bounty By Graft

Trouble May Result For The Guilty **Parties** 

Within the past few days the county papers have been printing a long article about the killing of a white wolf last Wednesday night, by Wm. R. Wyant and Henry Barber, of Weesaw township. The article was a blood curdling affair, and lead one to believe that they were reading the exploits of some border scout, as set forth in the half dime editions of Beadle's Library.

The story tells about a two night hunt for the wolf, and the fierce fight of the wolf with six dogs; and how the dogs were "cut and slashed until their shoulders were laid open almost to the bone." The animal was finally overpowered by Barber, who struck it a blow with the butt of his gun, breaking the gun in so

The reputation of the hunters, and the manner in which their story was told, made some people rather skeptical as to the truth of the story.

Later developments show, that the white wolf, which was killed after such a fierce struggle, was the pet house dog owned by Mrs. Henora Galivin, who resides 4 miles north of Galien. The dog was of Eskimo-Spitz breed and was never known to fight. Mrs. Galivin's son sent her the dog from Chicago six years ago, when it was a puppy, and she became so much attached to it, that she feels the loss greatly.

The "hunters" brought the scalp to Buchanan and then took it to St. Joseph, where they went before the county clerk and made affidavit that it was the scalp of a wolf, The affair looks very much like a bold attempt to hold-up the county for the \$25 00 bounty, and it may cause the parties serious trouble before they get through with the deal, as the county authorities are now making an in vestigation.

PREPARATION FOR CORN.

Ground Should Be Well Prepared and Plants Carefully Cultivated Ir. Good Yield Is Obtained.

The proper preparation of the soil for the corn crop is often slighted in the rush to get in as many acres a. can be cultivated on the farm. The soil is often not well plowed or well harrowed. Ofter large clods are left in the field, hoping to get them pulverized when it comes to the cultivation of the young plants. Then land is planted to corn without due consideration as to whether it contains plant food sufficient to grow a paying crop It is bushels of corn that count on the right side of the ledger when balancing up accounts in the fall, rather than acres cultivated. Practically it is as easy to cultivate an acre that wil. yield 75 bushels as it is to cultivate one that yields less than 25 bushels, and a moment's thought will show the economy of looking well to the fertility of the soil.


A few years ago, my attention was called to an acre of corn which yielded 65 bushels of nice shelled corn, while if it had been plowed and planted in the ordinary way, without any attention to fertilizing the soil, it would have done well to yield 30 bushels, says a writer in the Country Gentleman. 





Penitentary at Jackson Suffered From Bad Blaze—In mates Remain Quiet.

Jackson, Mich, April 13.—Originating at 10 o'clock in a bin of shavings on the first floor, fire did \$40,000 damage to the two-story wagon shop within Jackson pris n wall. The state loses \$25,000 estimated value of. the bulling and machinery. The Michigan Wagon Co. owner of a large stock of wagon materials in the structure loses \$12,000

Blow pipes entering the bin of shavings which ignited due to spontaneous combustion, swept the flames all through the building and within five minutes all hope of saving the property was out of question. All was destroyed. There was no panic among the prisoners all of whom were in their cells. Despite the fact that many of them knew the fire was in progress, they were surprisingly quiet.

#### State Items

Jumping from a Pere Marquette train Friday on his return from Chicago, where he had sold a ca load of cattle, William Vanderkolk, a wellto-do young farmer fell under the wheels at Vriesland and was decapitated, Tuesday night. His body was discovered by a pedestrian, who stumbled over the body. The head was found a few feet away. It is supposed that Vanderkolk had been asleep on the train, and that being suddenly aroused and fearing to miss his station he leaped from the coach into the darkness.

Twenty-eight horses were burned when Henry Spricks's livery stable was consumed last Thursday at midnight. One of the animals was a pacer valued at \$500. Only one horse escaped. Nearly all the equipment was also destroyed. The fire was started in the rear of the barn among the horses, and the belief is that it was caused by someone sleeping there Henry Spricks, the proprietor is one of western Michigan's best known horsemen, and is a character with a state reputation. His loss is \$6,000 without insurance, leaving him practically "broke."

Victor Matson, of St. Ignace who has the winter contract for carrying the mails to Cederville and Hessel, is supposed to have been drowned while making his trip Monday morring. He was in the habit of crossing a point of the lake on the ice, and as his horse was found on shore near Carp river, 14 miles from here, with the harness on and a tug cut or broken, it is thought that in trying to cross, the rig struck a weak spot went through and he was unable to get out. A short time ago his wife died and now his death will leave a family of five children, the oldest a girl ing." of 12, orphans, and in very poor cir-

Word reached Muskegon Friday night that after a weeks search the body of Laurence Rock, of that place had been found, head and shoulders, under a barbed wire fence, in three inches of water, from a small stream near the suburbs at Watertown, N.Y.
