WOULD VIOLATE THE LAW

Raising of the Fire Insurance
Rates Won't go in
Michigan

Lansing, Mich., April 27. The western union of fire insurance companies has announced that, because of the great losses of the union companies in San Francisco, insurance rates will probably be raised.

In speaking of this announcement, Insurance Commissioner Barry said today that at the time of the Bellaire case, in which union companies were interested, was before his department representatives of the organization made the announcement that it did not attempt to control fire insurance rates in Michigan.

In view of that statement Mr. Barry says he does not believe that there will be any concerted attempt to raise the rates in this state. Any move along that line will be met promptly by the department, as it will be in plain violation of the anti-trust law.

Independent action by independent companies will not, of course, be interfered with, but a general uniform

raise by union companies will receive prompt attention by the Commissioner.

State Items

While painting the interior of J. G. Windiate's meat market, at Flint, Wednesday night, Clarence E. Glassford was electrocuted by an arch light wire which he grasped. He fell from the ladder upon which he was working through a large plate glass window.

The Cromwell Lumber Co's mill and lumber yard at McBain is burning and portions of the village are threatened. The fire began at 10 o'clock Friday, in the engine room of the mill and the only fire protection is a small hand pump machine. The probable loss to the lumber company if the entire plant burns down will be \$50,000. Residents are fighting hard to save the village.

Although somewhat improved by rest former Gov. A. T. Bliss is still seriously ill at his home in Saginaw. His trouble is a recurrence of the general breaking down he experienced a few months ago when his life was almost despaired of.

The remains of Guy Richardson, the youth who committed suicide by taking carbolic acid because of his love for a young girl in Grayling, will be buried at Saginaw by the girl. She brought the body to Saginaw alone last Friday and had it interred in Forest Lawn cemetery. Richardson was 22 years of age and was employed as cook in the place where the girl stayed. He had always been known as a steady industrious youth.

For climbing a fire escape at the Michigan Female seminary, at Kalamazoo and taking a lunch with two young ladies, Earl Goodenow and Ford Monnich were Friday morning fined \$10, the charge being disorderly conduct. Dr. Gray, president of the seminary, called officers to arrest the young men as peepers the night of April 17, when the luncheon was held, but the youths had disappeared and that there had been a luncheon was not learned until one of the girls confessed Wednesday.

Caught, jammed between a load of lumber and a door sill, Ed Parkhurst of Flint, was being crushed to death. Just in time, the team drawing the load was stopped. Parkhurst escaped with three broken ribs and internal injuries, the extent of which have not yet been determined. The accident happened Friday morning at the plant of the Flint Wagon works where Parkhurst is employed.

LOOKS GOOD TO MR. EARLE

Good Roads Commissioner is
Quite Optimistic

MICHIGAN IN THE RACE

State Active in Work of Building First
Class Highways—Berrien County
First in Place This Year

Lansing, April 28.—State Highway Commissioner Horatio S. Earle is enthusiastic over the success of the good roads cause in Michigan. He says that not less than one third more work has been done to the earth roads of this state in this month than he ever saw done in April before, and believes it was largely brought about by the systematic work done the past winter in the farmers' institutes and the county road institutes.

"I am proud of Michigan, and we have a right to congratulate ourselves on what we have done in the short time we have had state help," said Mr. Earle today. "New Jersey was the first state to adopt a state aid law, and under it she built 10 miles the first year, 27 miles the second year, 32 miles the third year and 46 miles the fourth. Now compare with what we have done. We adopted the state reward road law in the spring of 1905. It did not take effect until July 1, 1905, yet we went to work and built seven and one-half miles of gravel road and eight and one-quarter miles of macadam, or a total of fifteen and three-quarters miles in the first half of the first year and there is now on the books of the state highway department to be built in 1906, applications for three miles of gravel stone, thirty-seven miles of gravel and fifty-one miles of macadam road, and more coming in every day.

"We shall be able to show November 1, 1906, that there has been built in the first sixteen months of state aid as many miles of road as New Jersey built in her first four years, and as much as Massachusetts or New York built in the first three years. It is true that we have not built so costly roads as some of the eastern roads are, and perhaps not so good, but we have built as good as we can afford, considering the amount of road we have in Michigan.

"Of our counties, Berrien county will be in first place this year, with Saginaw second. Gratiot county leads in the number of townships that have applied. Hamtramck township in Wayne county will build the most macadam roads, and although it is the smallest township in the county, it will be the leader in "mud-road" Wayne, and it is hoped by all up-to-date citizens in that county that the other townships will get into line."

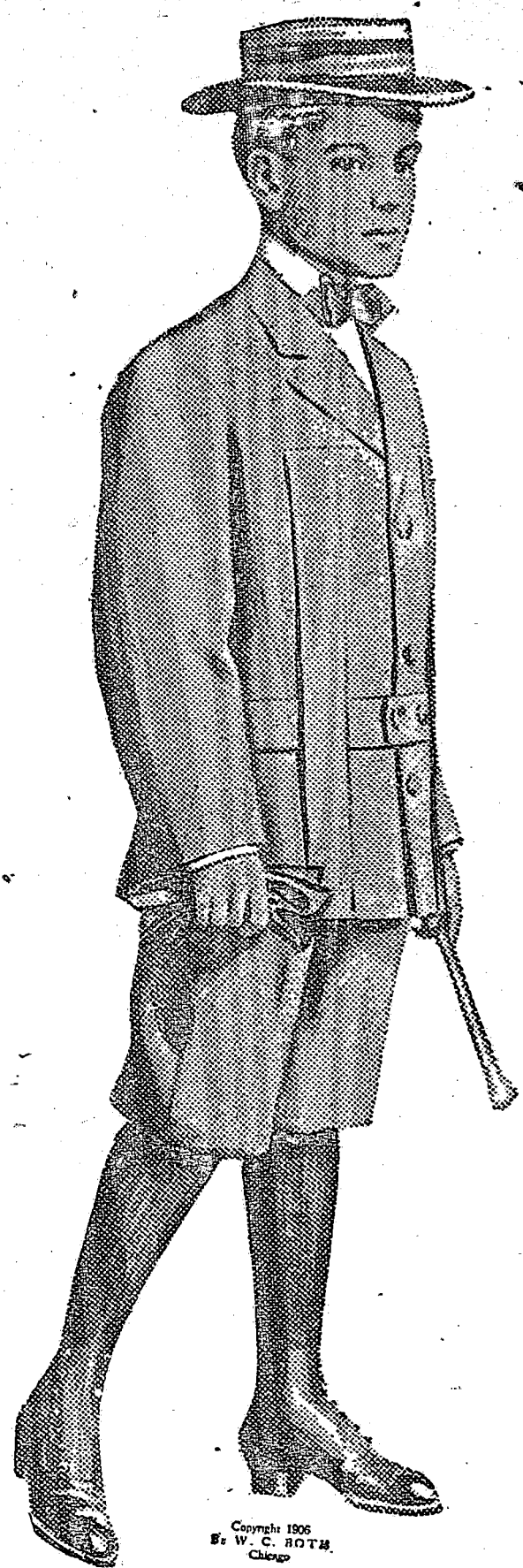

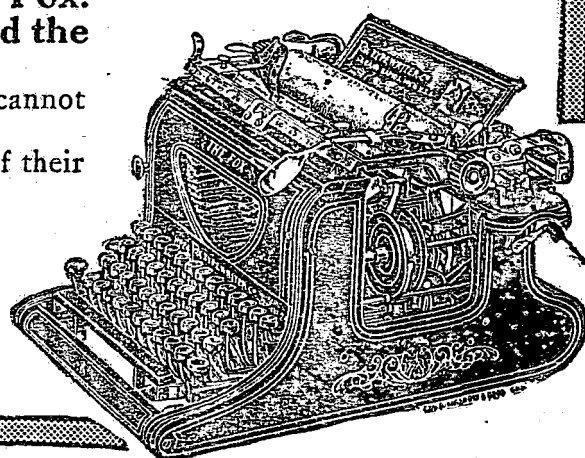

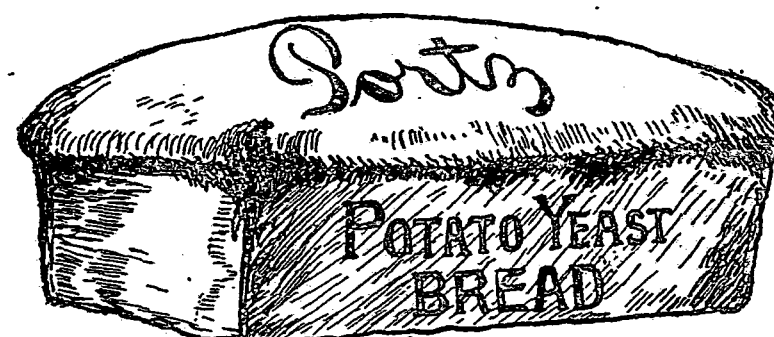

A Letter From San Francisco

The toll wing is a letter from Henry Kolb, relating his experience in the terrible San Francisco disaster. Crocker, Cal., April 24, 1906

Mr. John C. Dick,
Buchanan, Mich.

Dear Sir;

I will write you a few lines to let you know how I got out of the fire at San Francisco. I am here in a private hospital, 20 miles from the city, and was sent here by the Relief Corp. My hands and feet are badly burned, and my whole body was burned.

It was a terrible experience I had. I was caught under a building before I got out, without my clothing. There were 70 or 80 rooms in the building, and the occupants of only four rooms escaped alive. I took a woman and four children out of the building, but the woman died afterwards. I saw several children born in the park that morning.

As soon as I get well, I will return home, and I will never live in San Francisco any more.

After my terrible experience, it seemed for most of the day, that I was still under the house.

I wrote to George Leno from Oakland. Well, John, I am in good hands, and have a doctor and nurse. I think I will come out alright. Give my best regards to everybody and best wishes to you.
