## WORK IS NEARLY DONE

From This City to South Bend in 80 Minutes Will be Schedule

South Bend, Ind., May 11.—Contractor George Townsend having in charge the construction of the inter-urban road from this city to St. Joseph, Mich., has announced that he will have the entire line completed by May 15 and will upon that date turn the property over to the South Bend and Southern Michigan Railway company. Mr. Townsend fully expected to have the road completed several weeks ago, but experienced no end of trouble in making a fill at Hickory Creek, two miles south of St. Joseph.

Hon. Arthur Kennedy, vice president and General Manager J. McM. Smith, and other officials of the road made a test run from this city to Hickory Creek last Sunday. The distance is 32 miles and was made in exactly one hour. Contractor Townsend stated that the run from South Bend to St. Joseph can easily be made in one hour and 20 minutes allowing for all stops. ### State Items

In handling a loaded revolver Friday night, Bertha Murrer, 16 years old, of Detroit, was shot through the head. Her brother, Walter, 18 years old, had taken the revolver to the pantry a few minutes before and together they inspected the weapon. Bertha is said to have started to put the revolver away when it was discharged. Drs. Cree, Hastie and Baalen dressed the wound, but have grave doubts of the girl's recovery. The brother is now under arrest at the Grand River avenue police station.

To save her child from the wheels of a rapidly approaching street car, in Grand Rapids, Mrs. Oscar J. Warn sprang to its side and snatched it from the jaws of death, Friday. Then, fainting, the woman fell by the track just as the car sped by. Neither mother or child was injured. Mrs. Warn and her 4-year-old son were walking on South Division street when the little fellow suddenly darted from her side and ran directly in front of the car. When the mother attempted to rescue him, bystanders believed both would be killed.

While on her way with a party of girl friends to the home of Osie Bailey, at Kalamazoo, to leave a sum of money that had been collected among the female employes of the Riverside coating mills, Katie Volinski, of Chicago, was run down and instantly killed by a Michigan Central passenger train Friday afternoon. Miss Bailey is suffering with tuberculosis and her friends intended spending the noon hour with her and leaving a gift of money. Miss Volinski was

the second member of the party to step on the tracks. Seeing the train she attempted to turn about, but fell from fright and was caught by the pilot and hurled forty feet.

A scaffolding collapsed during a barn raising, at the farm of Cliff Aikman, at Almont, Thursday afternoon. Ten men fell 12 feet. James Anderson sustained a broken shoulder blade and internal injuries; John Bowen's wrist was broken.

Ira O. Clark, a milk dealer, of Jonesville, drove to the village cemetery, Friday, removed his coat, hat, shoes and stockings and tried to end his life by cutting his throat and wrists with a penknife. He was found weak from loss of blood, but will recover. He was despondent because of ill-health.

Deputy United States Marshal O. Donnel, of Grand Rapids, Friday arrested Frank Rollins in Hart, Mich. on charges of violating the postal laws, and the long mystery of the "black hand" in that region may be solved, as the evidence against Rollins is said to be strong. It is alleged he wrote "black hand" letters to ex-Senator James K. Flood, demanding money. Flood's mill was burned shortly after he refused to pay the money demanded. Various other jobs of like serious nature in that vicinity are attributed to Rollins, and the people of that vicinity have been terrorized for months. Rollins was held in \$2,000 bail for trial at the October term of court. He was unable to furnish a bond.



### A Letter of Interest

The following letter is from Floyd Beach, of Cranbrook, B. C., to his brother, and contains some very interesting news:

Cranbrook, B. C.  
May 6, 1906.

My dear brother:

I received yours of April 10, forwarded from Fort Steele just yesterday and I hasten to answer it.

I like my place very much. Mr. McVittie is about the only surveyor in East Kootenay, or at least he has almost all the work to do. He has jobs as far west as Kootenay lake and as far east as Lethbridge and farther. He is now about 50 miles east of Lethbridge. I am busy all the time in the office at present. Before long I will have a job at Yohk, surveying the right of way for the new line of the C. P. R. that is going into Spokane. You can locate Yohk about 30 miles east of the southern end of Kootenay lake and about 5 miles north of the international boundary. I will be practically responsible for the correctness of that survey and the plots of it. I will also have to lay out a town sit near Gull lake east of Lethbridge, in all probability, so you see I am in a way to see quite a bit of country.

A great deal of wheat is raised around Lethbridge, I am told. For years people thought that the land was good for nothing but grazing, but the Mormons went in there and demonstrated that winter wheat could be successfully raised. Most of the land is taken up, but Mr. McVittie knows of one or two pieces that can yet be got. Even this is in private hands and costs \$15 an acre, though they sell on easy terms. \$2 an acre down and the rest on long time, I believe. Most of the land is bought in 320 or 650 acre lots. They break mostly with steam gang plows and harvest with a steam rig. Mr. McVittie says it is nothing uncommon to see a traction engine starting off from Lethbridge with a car with a house on it, and three or four wagons hitched behind. It is all prairie and unfenced, so they don't need to follow any road, but just start out in the direction they want to go, avoiding only plowed land.

By the way, if you know anyone who is thinking of coming out here to get a farm, and there are hundreds of Americans jumping at the opportunity, which isn't going to last long, Mr. McVittie is the man they should correspond with. I find he has a reputation of being exactly as good as his word. He would meet prospective buyers, and show them the land and assist them in anyway in his power.

Cranbrook is nicely located, though not so beautifully as Fort Steele. We have a beautiful view of the Rockies. Mount Fisher shows up splendidly, and the Steeples are very pretty. The Selkirks show as rounded buttes rising from the level and are not nearly as high as the Rockies. The Rockies are true to their name. Their summits are saw edged and barren, while the Selkirks are wooded and have snow only at the top and scanty at that. It is remarkable where trees will grow. I have seen them where they appeared to be rooted in the bare face of a canyon and big trees where there was only a thin layer of soil on the rocks.

of the Rockies is limestone, but at Bull river, it is slate. The valley is heavily glaciated. In some places there is a bed rock of slate covered with from one to twenty feet of glacial moraine, consisting mostly of rounded boulders and stone with or without sand and clay, the boulders being of red porphyry, a similar green stone and quartz. Then on top of the moraine is a heavy layer of weathered slate that ranges in size from fine dust and particles the size of a grain of wheat to pieces that a man cannot handle alone. This weathered slate has probably been broken from the mountain above by frost and water. Gold is found much more plentifully in the region of slate formation, than in the region of limestone.

There is a lead and silver smelter at Marysville, some 16 or 20 miles north of here that employs 75 or 100 men. They do not separate the lead and silver, but cast them together and they are separated somewhere else.


