

Niles, Getting Ready for

the Laying of Trackage The Niles and Buchanan Railway company had a gang of men at work Tuesday on West Main street, just across the river, unloading rails, setting grade stakes and preparing the

way for laying trackage. As stated in these columns in the Tuesday's edition. the company's franchise would expire Wednesday if work had not been commenced, and while they are not ready to build the line, they have commenced work to hold their franchise. However, it is their intention to push the work through next fall.

The company's franchise provides that they may build an independent bridge, in case Niles does not remove the present Main street structure, but if Niles decides to build a new bridge, the provision in the franchise giving the company the right to construct an independent bridge, becomes null and yoid. It will then be up to Niles and the company to build a joint bridge, each

party to bear such portion of the cost thereof as may be agreed upon. * * *

Mr. Warner, the first candidate for governor to be named in Michigan by the voters, accepted in a speech delivered at the convention's first session the nomination given him in

the June primaries. It was pronounced by those familiar with his public career the strongest, most carefully prepared and most effective address the governor has ever delivered.

As a summary of two years of close observation, the governor expressed the conviction that there never was a time when the people watched as carefully and interestedly the conduct of public affairs and when officials

generally were more responsive to public sentiment. In an inventory of the accomplish-

ments of his administration, he frankly admitted that some of the 1,020 acts of the legislature to which he

had given, his assent had proven a disappointment. One of these was the law making changes of venue mandatory.

Another was the law limiting to dependent relatives the right of action against those responsible for death or injury caused by careless ness or neglect.

Another was the Gaibraith law permitting manipulation under the guise of equalizing values" in fixing the railroad rate of taxation. Its passage, however, had the advantage of resulting in a judicial determination of an important question.

Divers grounds for Republican optimism were outlined and satisfaction with the primary law and he expressed gratitude for the honor of being the first beneficiary under its







The Woman: At this moment I would willingly share with you half of all I possess in the world.


The Girl: But all this mystery!




