

Formaldehyde Discovered In Milk Distributed In-St. Joseph.

E. A. Haven, one of the many depities that the state pure food department keeps on the move, arrived in the twin cities yesterday and immediately secured samples of the milk and cream that various local dairies and creameries are distributing and selling. Deputy Haven will be here for two or three days and every milkman in both cities will be asked to contribute a bottle of the milk they are leaving at the homes of citizens.

Unofficially it has been learned that a dairyman in St. Joseph has been selling to his customers milk that has been preserved. Traces of formaldehyde have been found in the milk that was shipped from a Holland dairy, Deputy Haven refused to divulge any facts relative to the discovery but it is certain that arrests will follow.

Milk sours easily in summer and especially during a severe warm spell, such as is now holding the twin cities in a sweltering grip. Many people, particularly housewives, are of the opinion that if milk does not sour it is perfectly fresh and good. Such is not the case. Preservatives, in the form of chemicals such as formaldeyhde, are mixed with the milk and the product keeps longer than unpreserved milk When the weather is intensely warm the dairyman or farmer is tempted to "doctor" the ing in nomination on the Republican

Another Factory.

Within the past few days arrangements have been all but completed for the locating of another factory in Buchanan. Tom Brown, a former Buchanan citizen being behind the enterprise.
