



Only two Passengers Killed in Michigan in Year 1905

IN STATE

Lansing, Mich., Sept. 1.-Michigan railroads during the year 1905 made a remarkably good showing in the matter of passengers killed and injured, according to their reports on , file with Railroad Commissioner Atwood. Only two passengers were killed and 15,723,682 passengers were carried.

This is at the rate of one passenger for every 7,861,841 passengers, as compared with one killed to every 1,625,257 carried throughout the United States for the fiscal year of the interstate commerce commission, ending June 30, 1905.
