

When there is no general water supply, nor good sewers, much may be done to protect the wells by the abolition of cess pits and privy vaults, by the use of dry earth in privies, and by the frequent removal therefrom of all their con-

Sources of and the apparatus serv_ ing for the general supply of water for drinking or domestic purposes, and also those for the removal of refuse, should be frequently inspected by sanitary officials.

The rinsing of dirty vessels, washing, and every pollution, especially by domestic refuse, near a source or neighborhood of water for drinking or domestic purposes, should be prohibited and guarded against.

Whenever the conditions are such that typhoid is threatened, the persons or the public endangered should be promptly warned to "boil the drinking water."

SPEECH AND SONG Doubtful if Exchange Can be Prohibited by Statute

One of the points in the interstate commerce law on which railway attorneys differ is that relating to the exchange of transportation for advertis. transportation and does not come under the prohibition of passes. It is also quite generally agreed that a law prohibiting exchange of a commodity or service for anything except money would not stand the test of the courts. > It is held by some attorneys that the word "different" as used in this clause relates to the kind of compensation rather than the amount, inasmuch as the amount is covered by the words "greater or less." They therefore hold that all transportation must be paid for in money only and not in any other value. Others hold that this interpretation is preposter. ous. The object of the law is to prevent unjust discrimination, and the word "different" refers to amount of compensation rather than kind. It is interesting to note that the strict constructionists of this clause have at the same time advised their clients that, while they may not contract in advance for such exchange of commodities, they may pay an existing or established claim with transportation. For instance, a claim for damages to person or property may be satisfied by transportation instead of money

We believe that a candid interpre tation of this provision of the law is that the published tariffs are to be impartially adhered to and that the lawmakers have not intended to prohibit legitimate exchange. It is hardly probable that they would have imperiled the law when it comes under judicial interpretation by putting in a word which in nowise added to its strength or assisted in accomplishing the real end of law.

Some of the large railway companies and systems have instructed their officials to discontinue all issue of advertising transportation, except that existing legal contracts may be carried out to the end of the year. Lansing, Mich., Nov. 2.—One hundred and ninety-five school districts will not share Noy. 12 in the distribution of the primary school money received from accumulated railroad taxes.

Pure Food Department Will Ask Legislature to Amend Present Law

Lansing, Mich., November 2 -State Dairy and Fool Commissioner Bird has discovered that under a new law passed at the legislative session in 1905 preservatives dangerous to the public health may be used in foods sold in Michigan, and he will ask that the law be amended at the next session of the legislature to prohibit the use of such preservatives.

The objectionable preservatives are saccharın, formaldehyde, benzoate of sodium, boric acid and sallicylic acid.

Experiments conducted at Washington by what has been known as the "poison squad," consisting of a num ber of young men who ate preserved foods, have demonstrated that these preservatives are deleterious, and an effort will be made to prevent the use of all preservatives except the natural ones, such as vinegar, sugar salt, etc.

The state pure food department has been conducting experiments on guiena pigs with the objectionable preservatives and the results have been disasterous to the pigs.


