sick with typhoid fever. When there is no general water supply, nor good
sewers, much may be done to protec sewers, much mells by the abolition of cess pits earth in privies, aud by the frequent removal therefrom of all their con-
tents.
Soarces of and the apparatus serv ng for the general supply of wate for drinking or domestic purposes, and also those for the removal of re-
fuse, should be frequently inspected y sanitary officials.
The rinsing of dirty vessels, wash ing, and every pollution, especially by domestic refuse, near a source or eighborhood of water for drinking or domestic purposes, should
hibited and guarded aganst. Whenever the conditions that typhoid is threatened, the per
ons or the public endangered should be promptly warned to "boil th drinking water
It may be found necessary to pro-
hibit the use of wells, ponds, lake hibit the use of wells, ponds, lakes, swimming and washing establish ments and public lavatories in local-
ities threatened or attacked by ities threatened or attacked by
