A Trip Through Western Oregon by Rev. Douglass

Continued from last Issue

(Continued from Friday)

There are several quite large saw mills between Mapleton and Florence. Many of the people depend upon salmon fishing for a living. We were told of one man who clears about \$300 in two months fall fishing We did not see any fresh salmon, but we bought some sait salmon at 5 cents per lb. We were not there in the season for fishing. There is not much farming done as the valleys are small and markets are so far distant. It is quite a dairy country, cream being shipped from there to Monroe, Corvaltes and Independence, nearly 150 miles. You can guess the condition the cream would be in when it reaches the creamery. But they think it pays. One man near Triangle lake, 27 miles nearer Independence, told us that 16 cows brought him over \$10000 a month. It seemed to us that people made a living about as easy as any place we ever saw.

Saturday afternoon we started on our homeward journey. Camped at a place called Deadwood till Tuesday afternoon. Monday we put in fishing caught some nice trout.

Tuesday afternoon we went on. (We did not go back over the Sinslaw road but over the Lake Creek road, a shorter and much better road) That evening we passed a lake that was about a mile long and three-fourths of a mile wide, way up in the moun-

Wednesday we climbed the steepest hills (roads) that we had been overcalled the mile and a half hill with steep grades. A few days before one of a four-horse team fell off the grade and was killed.

Thursday evening we reached home, having traveled about 300 miles with teams over some of the wildest country in Oregon. We were much benefited by the trip both physically and mentally. And all of us had acquired a rich brown color.

A word corcerning the timber:

We had heard of Oregon timber. we measured a fir tree 24 feet in circumference, p obably two hundred feet tall We saw some larger trees

The mountains are covered with a rank growth of vegetation. In many places it is almost impossible to penetrate. Some places the ferns were 6 feet high and very thick. One afternoon with some of the children I climbed to the top of one of the hills. Thought we could go down another

way. We went through a veritable jungle. Some places we had to climb over felled trees and logs 6 feet in diameter covered with moss, and altogether it was an experience worth having. Deer and bear are in abundance We saw many trees from which the bark is peeled and dried to

We wish our Michigan friends could take such a trip with us.

Miss Grace Stults, Attacked, Beats Tramp's Head on Railroad Track

The Sunday Inter Ocean had the following article about the bravery of Miss Grace Stults, sister-in-law of M. L. Hanlin, manager of Celfor Tool Company, this city: "Brutally at tacked by a strange man when she was at a lonely point on the railroad tracks near Buffington, Ind., Miss Grace Stults of Chicago yesterday afternoon turned desperately upon her assailant, threw him down, and beat his head against the rail until he was unconscious. Then she ran screaming for help.

Miss Stults is 18 years old and pretty Her father is Porter M. Stults, general superintendent of the yards of the Illinois Steel company. The family live at 7109 Euclid avenue, but they are spending the summer in camp on the Calumet river, near Clark, Ind. Friday night Miss Stults came to Chicago with them in the camp, and was returning to the camp when attacked.

Miss Stults missed her regular train at South Chicago. When that happened she had to take a train on the Lake Shore to Indiana Harbor. That left her five miles from camp, but she did not mind it very much on her own account. The day was fine and walking on the tracks was rather enjoyable for a change. Her only anxlety was lest the family should worry about her absence, so she hurried as fast as she could.

When she got to Buffington, a mile from the starting point, she noticed a man loafing about, but she paid little attention to him. When she had proceeded about a mile from Buffirgton she had a funny feeling at the back of her head which prompted her to look around. Then she saw the man was following her.

Miss Stults was considerably disturbed and quickened her speed Suddenly she was thrown into a panic for the man overtook her and spoke to her.

"Would you mind if I walked along with you?" he said.

She minded it very much, but all she could do in her fright was to shake her head and stammer some-

Then the man seized her about the waist and attempted to draw her from the tracks. She did not scream or faint. Instead she took a hatpin and tried to jab it into the man's eyes. He wrested it faom her without letting go his hold.

Frightened so that her tongue clung to the roof of her mouth and her knees trembled beneath her, she drew another hatpin from her hat and renewed her defense. This time she struck the man a severe blow in the ribs. For an instant he released his hold. As he did so she swung around and the man lost his balance

In falling his head struck the steel rail, and he was stunned. Before he could arise she threw herself upon him, clutched at his throat, and beat his head against the rail until he lay there still and silent.

Then, when it was all over, she ranscreaming down the track, looking for a chance to faint. She found some laborers in a field, told them the story, and fainted. 


