PRES. THARWOOD INTERVIEWED

Anent South Bend Telephone **Company Franchise.**

OUTLINES SEVERAL POINTS

Showing Why the Company Should Be Granted a Franchise by the Village.

The president of the South Bend Telephone Co., Mr. Theodore Tharwood called on a RECORD representative yesterday and outlined the following interview in support of his petition for a franchise:

"The South Bend Home Telephone Co. has in St. Joseph county, Ind., 7 independent exchanges with over 6,000 phones and on account of Buchanan being so close to South Bend has a large number of persons living in Berrien county, Mich., who want quick and easy access and direct communication with patrons of the Home Telephone Co. of South Bend. Added to this fact is the large number of rural subscribers who now have Home phones and who do busi ness with the professional and busi ness men of Buchanan and who are asking for a direct toll wire with a ten cent rate between South Bend and Buchanan.


Let us be done with all rivalry between state and federal jurisdiction. The trust question cannot be fenced up by STATE lines. Whether we will or not, it has become A NATIONAL CAUSE, and it will have to be decided in a national forum. The effort should be rather to seek one effectual remedy than to emphasize a conflict between many.

THE MOST EFFECTIVE COMBINATION IS THAT ORGANIZED THROUGH STOCK OWNERSHIP. THERE IS NO INHERENT POWER IN ONE CORPORATION TO OWN THE STOCK OF ANOTHER. THE STATES WHICH DENY SUCH OWNERSHIP OF STOCK ARE POW-ERLESS TO PROTECT THEMSELVES. ALL THE CHIEF COMBINA-TIONS NOW IN EXISTENCE OPERATE THROUGH STOCK OWNER-SHIP. CONGRESS CAN AND SHOULD DENY TO INTERSTATE COM-MERCE CORPORATIONS THE POWER TO OWN STOCK IN OTHER CORPORATIONS, CONGRESS HAVING ASSUMED AND EXERCISED THE POWER TO CREATE INTERSTATE CORPORATIONS.

Practical advantages would follow the denial to interstate corporations of the right to own stock in OTHER corporations. There would be nothing startling or revolutionary in the act if congress should pass a general law on the subject.



phone Co. charged 25 cents for a three-minute service from Niles or Buchanan to South Bend. On ac count of the Home Telephone Co. in stalling a pay station in Niles and threatening the invasion of the terri tory with modern and uptodate tele phone exchanges, and the reduction to 15 cents for a five-minute message by the Home Co., compelled the Bell Co. to reduce its heretofore excessive toll rates and has also kept their exchange rate lower than usual.

"The strong inroads of the Home Tel. Co. is reponsible for the re duction and shows in a measure the advantage of recognizing an independent telephone company. These forced reduction in prices would not have been given the public had it not been for the strong features inaugurated by the independent company whereby the people are given good telephone service at a reasonable rate.

"In addition to the above features the exchanges in Berrien Co., Mich., are very close and under the present conditions, a person living $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Buchanan, but being on the Niles Exchange, has to pay 10 cents to talk to a Buchanan business man or resident subscriber.

"The Home Company if given a franchise will install an up-to-date exchange, install a central energy system the same as have been installed in all larger cities. THE TRADES UNION IS THE VOLUNTARY ASSOCIATION OF THE MANY FOR THE BENEFIT OF ALL THE COMMUNITY. THE TRUST IS THE VOLUNTARY ASSOCIATION OF THE FEW THEIR OWN BENEFIT.

The workers of the country have pretty thoroughly mastered the broad economic truth that ORGANIZATION IS THE WATCH-WORD OF MODERN INDUSTRY. Labor concedes the right of organization among employers. It is perfectly willing to deal with such associations, provided its own rights are not denied or invaded; to put it more strongly, PROVIDED its rights are recognized and
