PRES. THARWOOD INTERVIEWED

Agent South Bend Telephone Company Franchise.

OUTLINES SEVERAL POINTS

Showing Why the Company Should Be Granted a Franchise by the Village.

The president of the South Bend Telephone Co., Mr. Theodore Tharwood called on a RECORD representative yesterday and outlined the following interview in support of his petition for a franchise:

"The South Bend Home Telephone Co. has in St. Joseph county, Ind., 7 independent exchanges with over 6,000 phones and on account of Buchanan being so close to South Bend has a large number of persons living in Berrien county, Mich., who want quick and easy access and direct communication with patrons of the Home Telephone Co. of South Bend. Added to this fact is the large number of rural subscribers who now have Home phones and who do business with the professional and business men of Buchanan and who are asking for a direct toll wire with a ten cent rate between South Bend and Buchanan.

"Before the Home phone was installed in South Bend the Bell Telephone Co. charged 25 cents for a three-minute service from Niles or Buchanan to South Bend. On account of the Home Telephone Co. installing a pay station in Niles and threatening the invasion of the territory with modern and up-to-date telephone exchanges, and the reduction to 15 cents for a five-minute message, by the Home Co., compelled the Bell Co. to reduce its heretofore excessive toll rates and has also kept their exchange rate lower than usual.

"The strong inroads of the Home Tel. Co. is responsible for the reduction and shows in a measure the advantage of recognizing an independent telephone company. These forced reduction in prices would not have been given the public had it not been for the strong features inaugurated by the independent company whereby the people are given good telephone service at a reasonable rate.

"In addition to the above features the exchanges in Berrien Co., Mich., are very close and under the present conditions, a person living 3 1/2 miles from Buchanan, but being on the Niles Exchange, has to pay 10 cents to talk to a Buchanan business man or resident subscriber.

"The Home Company if given a franchise will install an up-to-date exchange, install a central energy system the same as have been installed in all larger cities. They intend to give subscribers on one exchange the benefit of free service to and from their exchanges in this county so that if a Buchanan subscriber wishes to talk to his relatives or a business man in Niles, Gahen, Berrien Springs or any other exchange he will not have to pay his little 10 cents each time, thus avoiding a system of exhortation, or in other words, paying twice for one service when one price should suffice.

"By the one price system harmonic ringing machines will be used that will only ring the subscriber wanted instead of ringing all as under the old system. It will be impossible for the other subscribers coming on the line without the central operator's knowledge.

"There are many other advantages showing the Home Telephone Co. is entitled to a franchise when good service from an economical standpoint can be secured.

Stock Ownership Greatest Trust Evil.



By Attorney General WADE H. ELLIS of Ohio.

TWO important facts must be recognized and accepted before any progress can be made in solving the problem of the trusts. The first of these is that HONEST CO-OPERATION IS NEEDED TO RIGHT THE WRONGS, AND, SECOND, THAT HONEST CO-OPERATION IS NOT ONE OF THE WRONGS TO BE RIGHTED.

Let us be done with all rivalry between state and federal jurisdiction. The trust question cannot be fenced up by STATE lines. Whether we will or not, it has become A NATIONAL CAUSE, and it will have to be decided in a national forum. The effort should be rather to seek one effectual remedy than to emphasize a conflict between many.

THE MOST EFFECTIVE COMBINATION IS THAT ORGANIZED THROUGH STOCK OWNERSHIP. THERE IS NO INHERENT POWER IN ONE CORPORATION TO OWN THE STOCK OF ANOTHER. THE STATES WHICH DENY SUCH OWNERSHIP OF STOCK ARE POWERLESS TO PROTECT THEMSELVES. ALL THE CHIEF COMBINATIONS NOW IN EXISTENCE OPERATE THROUGH STOCK OWNERSHIP. CONGRESS CAN AND SHOULD DENY TO INTERSTATE COMMERCE CORPORATIONS THE POWER TO OWN STOCK IN OTHER CORPORATIONS, CONGRESS HAVING ASSUMED AND EXERCISED THE POWER TO CREATE INTERSTATE CORPORATIONS.

Practical advantages would follow the denial to interstate corporations of the right to own stock in OTHER corporations. There would be nothing startling or revolutionary in the act if congress should pass a general law on the subject.

It would simply be an adaption of the common law—merely an extension of the POLICY ALREADY ENFORCED BY CONGRESS with respect to all corporations created under its direct authority. I do not predict that the policy suggested will solve the problem of the trusts, but it may remove the MOST OBVIOUS of existing evils, and, more important than all else, it would make the promoters of every great enterprise conduct it openly under one name.

The battle for business would then be conducted WITHOUT CONCEALED WEAPONS, and the natural growth of corporations would not need to be retarded by a resort to governmental restrictions which oppose sound economic laws.

The Labor Union Is Not a Trust.

By SAMUEL GOMPERS, President of the American Federation of Labor.

THE trades union finds its greatest development under the SAME ECONOMIC CONDITIONS WHICH PRODUCE TRUSTS—that is, the introduction of machinery, the subdivision of industry, the adoption of vast and complicated systems of production which obliterate the individuality of the worker and thus force him into an association, but not a trust, with his fellows in order that collectively they may PROTECT THEIR RIGHTS as wageworkers and as citizens and also guard the interests of all workers.

THE TRADES UNION IS THE VOLUNTARY ASSOCIATION OF THE MANY FOR THE BENEFIT OF ALL THE COMMUNITY. THE TRUST IS THE VOLUNTARY ASSOCIATION OF THE FEW FOR THEIR OWN BENEFIT.

The workers of the country have pretty thoroughly mastered the broad economic truth that ORGANIZATION IS THE WATCHWORD OF MODERN INDUSTRY. Labor concedes the right of organization among employers. It is perfectly willing to deal with such associations, provided its own rights are not denied or invaded; to put it more strongly, PROVIDED its rights are recognized and conceded. When we take up the case of the worker as a CONSUMER, still speaking for the masses, the situation is more complicated. The worker has not yet developed the same capacity to protect himself as a consumer that he has as a producer, or, rather, to put it more accurately, TRUST ABUSES ARE MORE PRONOUNCED IN THE REALM OF DISTRIBUTION. The control of vast distributing powers by certain trusts has been acquired through means which are only beginning to be understood by the people at large—the consumers.

ble for the theories advanced by some people. A good deal has been said about poles, but the fact is that under the present construction, instead of a lot of high poles with innumerable cross arms with open wires, there will be an all cable plant and most of the poles will be in the alley. "Under the system we intend to install, a telephone subscriber, instead of being connected with a small exchange of only 500 subscribers, will virtually be a part of a 2,000 phone

system and can talk for the same annual rental that a subscriber is paying now to talk to 325 subscribers."

ATHLETIC CLUB FOR THE MEN

Business Men Form One With a Charter Membership of Seventy

SUCCESS IS NOW ASSURED

Members Held an Enthusiastic Meeting in the City Hall, Organized and Elected Officers

Seventy business men of St. Joseph organized an association which will be known as the Business Men's Athletic Association, and elected officers and a board of control, composed of substantial business men.

It is expected and planned that the new association will fill a long felt want among the business men of that city, and provide for them the physical exercise of which every business man whose duties keep him closely inside an office, requires.

A well equipped gymnasium will be provided for the members and the board of control was empowered to provide a building. It will be thoroughly equipped with the best appliances and the members will introduce such sports as indoor baseball, basketball, and other indoor gymnasium features. In the spring it is probable that a track team will be organized and that a baseball nine will also take the field.

The new organization opens with every promise of success, and it is sincerely hoped by the business men that it will prove to be of the value which they expect.

A Mandamus is Asked For

Niles Mayor Wants the Council to Return Funds it Appropriated

Attorney W. N. Burns played another trump card in the municipal anti-paving fight of Niles when he made application to Judge Coolidge for a writ of mandamus to compel the city council to re-transfer the moneys from the general paving fund back into the contingent and street and bridge funds, which were transferred from these funds by the council last Wednesday night.

Two thousand dollars was transferred from the contingent fund and \$500 from the street and bridge fund, leaving the contingent fund exhausted.

The action was taken by the council to brace up the general paving fund.

Hearing on this application for a mandamus will be taken November 25th, inst.

Prof. Adams

Suggests Plan for Interstate Commerce Commission

The Detroit Journal Tuesday quotes Professor Henry C. Adams of Ann Arbor, Michigan, chief statistician of the interstate commerce commission, as suggesting that the interstate commerce commission could accept state railroad commissioners as agencies for the investigation of federal questions of local rather than general interest and by means of the close intimacy thus established exert controlling influence upon the manner in which state commissions administer the power conferred upon them by the state.

This plan Prof. Adams said would avoid a congestion of cases before the interstate commerce commission as only cases of really national importance would then come before the national commission. At the meeting of the state railway commissioners in Washington recently, Prof. Adams said many of the delegates expressed views in harmony with the above suggestion of co-operation.

ST. JOE RETAILERS AFTER OUR TRADE

"The Pere Marquette to the Buchanan Trains to St. Joseph."

A prominent merchant of St. Joseph, a strictly dyed-in-the-wool believer in advertising says that St. Joseph must reach out her hand beyond her city boundary lines and has selected Buchanan as a possible prey to the alluring baits which that hustling town will soon offer to bargain hunters.

The merchant above referred to spoke to a bunch of good natured merchants, equally as anxious as himself to land more business. He outlined to the local merchants how they can get more trade from Buchanan and rural districts by insisting that the Pere Marquette start the trains from here direct to St. Joseph.

This furnishes food for thought. St. Joseph has a Merchant's Association. Every merchant is a member and judging by the "live wires" constantly boosted it is natural to infer that not a single member of the association belongs to a moss-covered rut. Every member is firmly rooted to the belief that their business can not thrive and prosper without advertising.

We admire these St. Joseph business men for breaking away from the yoke of ancient and worn out beliefs that "advertising doesn't pay." They have discovered that to make advertising pay is to put prices and give honest descriptions in their space. St. Joseph surely will grow as fast as their brains and liberal-minded merchants set the pace.

What St. Joseph can do Buchanan can follow. Why can't we have a merchant's association. It is likely that an organization composed of Buchanan's merchants can accomplish far more things for the town than a board of trade.

An association of this kind can help to secure better streets in the city; better country roads; uniform prices on staple goods; more hitching posts; uniformed hours for closing the stores; offer better inducements to all of our people to trade at home; a friendly feeling among all classes of merchants; patronize the home newspapers and co-operate with them in helping to boost Buchanan.

It merely takes a little determination to work together to accomplish these things but in the end we will find the efforts well worth spending.

Order's Funds in Jeopardy

Clash Between Bank and Modern Woodmen Over Big Sum

The Modern Woodmen of America do not know how the order will come out in the revelations brought about by the suicide of Frank Crocker, at one time supreme banker of the order.

He was cashier of the First National bank of Charlton, Iowa. He was given \$200,000 at first to deposit and showed a certificate of deposit signed by himself as cashier of the bank. He was bonded for \$400,000. Then he was given \$200,000 more. The order desired \$50,000, which he produced, leaving \$350,000, for which he showed a certificate of deposit. On his death it was found he had never deposited any of the funds. The directors of the bank say that as the bank never had the money on deposit it is not liable, although the officers of the order will try to hold the bank on the certificate of the cashier. Another interesting feature is the bond. It was taken out to cover the first \$200,000. The order will try to force the security to cover the entire deposit, but there will be a clash on this point.

Do you believe that if the council is willing to abide by the people's demands it is your duty to assist in bringing this telephone question to a quick settlement satisfactory not only to a few, but to ALL?

Now, at least one citizen has responded to our invitation to allow every RECORD reader to express his opinion. His opposition to a second telephone system is explained in his brief communication.

He may be the only citizen opposed to two telephone exchanges, or there may be many who favor a rival company.

But it's up to you to write your views. The Council will abide by the sentiment of the majority.

Your silence may be taken as an approval of the new movement. If the council ever bases its action on this and grants the franchise your howls and protests will be in vain.

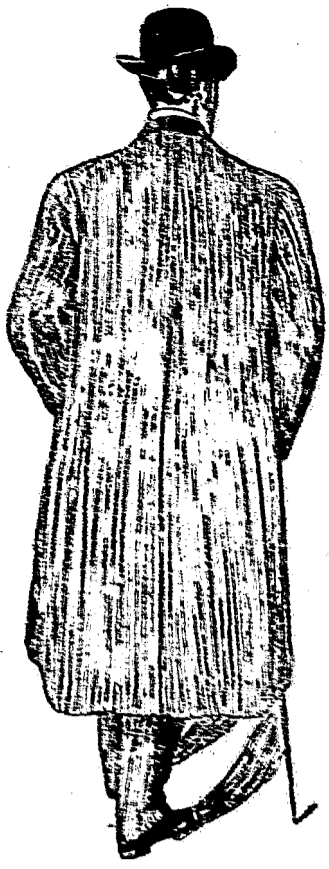

Young Playmate Says Friend Deliberately Shot Him.

Accused by the lips of his dying comrade as a murderer, Lester Wyckoff, 12 years old, of St. Joseph, is held in the county jail to await the fast approaching death of his playmate, Victor Alden, 11 years old.

One side of his body absolutely powerless, Victor Alden lies at his father's home in Pipestone township, a 22 caliber bullet, which entered above the right eye, being lodged at the base of the brain.

In whispers to his anguished mother the boy declared that his former friend, after a luckless Sunday afternoon rabbit hunt, had deliberately pointed the gun at him and fired.

Though the Wyckoff had hurried home and informed the neighborhood of the occurrence, it was almost an hour before the relief party reached the little fellow. The Wyckoff lad denied the conversation attributed to him and declared that he shot at a rabbit which ran between him and his friend. The officers, however, were unable to find the traces of the rabbit.

The alleged slayer shows absolutely no traces of regret or fear and his bearing is cool and composed.

Bigamist Admits Guilt

St. Joseph, Mich., Nov. 20.—When confronted by his first wife, W. B. Reading, charged with bigamy, confessed Monday that he was guilty.
