TOWN AND TROLLEY AGREE

New Carlisle's Injunction Suit is Dismissed

New Carlisle and the Chicago, Lake Shore & South Bend Railway company came to an agreement regarding the building of the trolley line through the streets of the town and the injunction suit which the town brought to prevent any work being done on the line inside the corporate limits was dismissed in the circuit court. New Carlisle granted a franchise to the company but the latter's failure to have cars operating within the time specified in the franchise was held by the town to abrogate the contract and in order to prevent further work on the line without another franchise the injunction was asked. It is said the company and town came to an agreement by which the time for the building of the road will be extended. Guy & Pattee represented New Carlisle and Harry Wain the trolley people.

GOOD ROADS ASSO. FORMED

To be Known as the Good Roads Association of Berrien County

MEANS MUCH TO COUNTY

Meeting Held in the Commercial National Bank in St. Joseph and Elected Officers

Good Roads Earle must have made an impression upon the audience which he addressed in St. Joseph recently. This is evidenced by the organization of a good roads association for Berrien county. While the majority of the citizens are in favor of better roads, they propose to work together and through the union develop a harmonious work in building better thoroughfares throughout the length and breadth of the county.

Acting under the suggestion offered by State Highway Commissioner Earle, a number of representative citizens residing in the various townships gathered in the Commercial National bank for the purpose of organizing a good roads campaign.

The name of the organization will be known as the Good Roads Association of Berrien County, and the purpose, true to the name, will be the advocating of better highways throughout the county.

To enable the organization to work and secure good roads under the county road law, it will be necessary for each and every township to petition the board of supervisors to submit the question to the electors of the county. Each petition which is circulated in the various townships must bear at least ten signatures of the freeholders residing in that township, to enable the proposition to be submitted to the people.

The new organization immediately took the necessary steps to secure these petitions and they will be presented to the board of supervisors at the next meeting. The following citizens were appointed to take up the work of circulating the petitions in each township, village and city, and the preliminary work will be pushed forward with all the speed possible.
