Much Uncertainty As To Supply For Christmas

Farmers and dealers alike are beginning to speculate as to what the poultry market will be for Christmas. Some believe that poultry is going to be higher, on account of greater scarcity than it was Thanksgiving. A slight advance in price since Thanksgiving would tend to produce that impression, but on the other hand the market is rather weak.

In fact much uncertainty exists both in Buchanan and in the east and in Chicago. The market last week in Chicago was firm and on the rise But dealers there do not think that prices for Christmas poultry will be higher than Thanksgiving.

Walter Wellman wires the Record Herald from Washington to say that President Roosevelt will accept the nomination for the presidency if Taft is defeated. He adds:

But suppose the party refuses to ac cept Taft; suppose the convention at Chicago, instead of nominating the secretary of war, takes the bull by the horns and names the president himself. What will Mr. Roosevel' do? He will accept. There will be nothing else for him to do unless some extraordinary and improbable conditions should present themselves

This statement that Mr. Roosevel will accept if nominated I make on my own responsibility. Mr. Roosevelt is not responsible for it. He has not said so. But he does not need to

It is possible that after some weeks the president may make another effort to stop the movement to make him the nominee. If he does so, I doubt if he will go so far as to declare that under no circumstances would he accept if nominated, and nothing less would be effective At present his mind is not inclined in that direction

Of the Village of Buchanan, Mich.

ORDINANCE III.

To Prevent Minors from Gaming The Common Council of the Vil-

lage of Buchanan ordains: It shall not be lawful for any person, by himself, his clerk, agent or servant, to allow or permit any minor to play at cards, dice, billiards, pool, or any game of chance, or to allow any minor to remain in any room Above quotations are on live weight where any such game is being played, without the written consent of the parent or guardian of such minor. Any person who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by tine not less than five dollars and not exceeding twenty-

To be Known as the Good Roads Association of Berrien County

Meeting Held in the Commercial National Bank in St. Joseph and Elected Officers

Good Roads Earle must have made an impression upon the audience which he addressed in St. Joseph recently. This is evidenced by the organization of a good roads association for Berrien county. While the majority of the citizens are in favor of better roads, they propose to work together and through the union develop a harmonious work in building better thoroughs throughout the

length and breadth of the county. Acting under the suggestion offered by State Highway Commissioner Earle, a number of representative citizens residing in the various townships gathered in the Commercial National bank for the purpose of organizing a good roads campaign.

The name of the organization will be known as the Good Roads Association of Berrien County, and the purpose, true to the name, will be the advocating of better highways throughout the county.

To enable the organization to work and secure good roads under the county road law, it will be necessary for each and every township to petition the board of supervisors to submit the question to the electors of the county. Each petition which is circulated in the various townships must bear at least ten signatures of the freeholders residing in that township, to enable the proposition to be submitted to the people.

The new organization immediately sook the necessary steps to secur these petitions and they will be presented to the board of supervisors at the next meeting. The following citizens were appointed to take up the work of circulating the petitions in each township, village and city, and the preliminary work will be pushed forward with all the speed possible.


