Hall. Mr. Langdon is the district attorney for San Francisco and was candidate for governor of California on the Independence League Ticket. The sub ject of his address was "The Struggle between Graft and Democracy." He explained how graft grew and spread in San Francisco, and how it grows and spreads in a hundred other Amer. ican cities.

Mr. Laugdon declared that graft is the worst form of despotism. It is a usurpation of government by forces of crime. There have been many virtuous kings and honest feudal lords, but the despotism of graft never can found-its rule upon a semblance of the moral law.

> The milk dealer was arrested for selling adulterated milk, but upon a trial he was acquitted. He then brought suit against the department.

> If he had succeeded in getting a judgment it would have been dangerous for the state to make arrests for violation of pure food laws. The trial judge, on motion of Assistant Attorney General Lawler, directed a verdict of no cause for action.

A Correction

In the Niles Star recently appeared an item which spoke of our Buchanan officers using stringent methods with old soldiers, particularly at pension time. To correct this wrong impression, Deputy Sheriff Frank Stryker went to Niles last week and the following correction was made in the Star:

Mr. Stryker said in reference to the arrest of Robt. Graham, that Graham's statement to the Star of his arrest put the officers in a bad light; meaning, that his arrest was not made to collect fees at pension time, but in accordance with section 5397 of the compiled laws; that Graham, who is an old soldier, stated to the officers that the liquor he used was procured in Niles by his son, and given him at his home. Notices have been posted at Buchanan, prohibiting the sale of liquors to Mr. Graham, who for the present was allowed to go. Mr.Stryk er not only desired to be kind to Mr Graham, but he delayed Graham's arrest for the purpose of giving him s chance to sober up before testifying

Witnesses Added By Many Prosecutor to Convict Minney

The prosecutor is leaving no stone unturned to produce the necessary evidence to convict Minney, and yesterday visited Benton Harbor, where he held a consultation with various persons relative to the coming trial of the famous case.

With every person who has the slightest inkling or knowledge of the case as a witness, the prosecuting attorney will go into court with a long list of names on the information filed against Minney. Yesterday afternoon the prosecuting attorney appeared in court, and asked that twenty names be added to the information. and Judge Coolidge granted, the request. The trial of the well known case is set for January 6, and will probably be attended by large crowds. Minney, who has many friends, will combat the testimony of the people with his previous character and good name, and will put

The final outcome of the proceedings against Minney will be awaited with interest, not only by friends of the accused man, but by the general public of the surrounding vicinity.



Setting the Table

The task of setting the table is a very important and not altogether easy one. If properly done, it is quite an art and should be looked upon accordingly. The most important feature of this work is to know what to put on and where to properly place it; for instance, the number of spoons is regulated according to the number of courses the meal contains. To see that the room is in order, is the first thing; then, that the table is in the middle of the floor and the linen is immaculate. Lay the silence cloth and then the center piece and flowers, if they are to be used. Next come the plates, knives, forks and spoons. Allow twenty to twenty-four inches to each person and the width of the largest plate between the knife and fork. Place the silver one inch from the edge of the table, placing the knife at the right of the plate, sharp edge in, and fork at the left, tines up. Place the spoons at the right of knife, bowls up. Place all silver so that, that to be used first is at the outside. Place the glass for water over the knife a little to the right. Place bread and butter plate over the fork a little to the left. Place the napkin between the knife and fork, if no plate is used; at the left of the plate, if the plate is used, and at the right, if the napkin ring is used. Place individual salt and peppers in front of each plate. Place dishes of olives, jelly, etc., so that they will balance.

The appearance of the table adds greatly to the enjoyment of the meal and therefore is most important. The simplest meal may look attractive if it is properly placed on the table.



With an open jack knife, most formidable in size and appearance, F. H. Goodenough of Benton Harbor tried to kill his daughter and entire family, because of his displeasure at a supposed injury last Monday.

The man resides with his daughter on Bishop street, in Benton Harbor, and is a man who in his lifetime has fought in many battles. He is a veteran of the civil war, and has always been a man of peaceful attitude, and

of quiet disposition all his life. Some time ago he suffered an at tick and he was then removed from Niles to Benton Harbor to make his home with his daughter in that city, and during his residence, there has been known for his many acts of kindness and generosity. Up to Mon

day night Mr. Goodenough had not exhibited any signs of insanity, which suldenly came upon him late in the

Without any warning and with all the rage his frenzied body could produce, the demented man attacked the members of the household. In his desperation to revenge an imaginary wrong, Mr. Goodenough drove the family throughout the-house, shouting his intention to kill them all. Crying that they had abused him without cause, the man, who, but a short time before was of a quiet and retiring nature, became a raving man-

Frightened beyond all control by giving vent to screams, which at tracted the attention of Deputy Sheriff Pearl and a neighbor named Annis, the murderous intent of the insane man was averted and he was quickly disarmed. The deputy and Mr. Annis succeeded in quieting the daughter of the would-be slayer shortly regained her composure. Sheriff Tennant was notified and the demented man was removed to the county jail. He is resting quietly today, and has exhibited no signs of another attack.



By WILLIAM SULZER, Representative From New York. HAVE THE WORST CURRENCY AND BANKING SYSTEM IN THE WORLD. IT IS ALL FOR THE BANKS AND NOTHING FOR THE PEOPLE. IT IS OBSOLETE AND INADEQUATE.

Congress must pass a CURRENCY REFORM 基金数据数据数据 LAW immediately. The present stringency is caused by a few bankers and a few individuals hoarding money, and most of it is the money of the people. The national banks MUST GET OUT OF THE GOVERNING BUSINESS, and the government must do its own financial business like other great countries.

Just think of it. There is \$200,000,000 of the PEOPLE'S MONEY deposited by the government in the national banks of the country and not drawing a dollar interest, and these banks are LOAN-ING THAT MONEY OUT TO THE PEOPLE at 10 to 20 per cent and even higher rates of interest.

These banks now have the AUDACITY to demand that the government issue more bonds in time of peace to give them a chance to get more money from the people and loan it to them again at high rates of interest. It is ALL WRONG, and congress should remedy the evil at once.

OVE is the feeling that arises when we have the sense of CLOSE UNITY WITH ANOTHER HUMAN LIFE, and it is the desire to accomplish this unification that is the general characteristic, because the worst and hardest thing in human experience is LONELINESS. Now, love is nothing but the desire of the human soul to pass out of this state, for we are by nature SOCIAL. We are PARTIAL BEINGS, and a part of our life is in every life.

REVERENCE IS A CHARACTERISTIC OF FINE LOVE, BUT THE OTHER SORT, THE COUNTERFEIT LOVE, IS DISTINGUISHED BY IRREVERENCE, IT TREATS ITS OBJECT AS A THING TO BE USED. ABUSED AND THROWN ASIDE

There is nothing more characteristic of the INFAMOUS NA-TURE OF COUNTERFEIT LOVE than the fact that it despises the thing which it has degraded, and if there is under the guise of marriage and true love a contempt it is in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred due to the previous degradation. And BECAUSE LOVE IS REVERENT IT IS TRANQUIL, while the counterfeit has hot fits of excitement. Love is disinterested; it consists in promoting the well being of the OTHER, not only accepting hardship, but imposing it. So the wife of the merchant threatened with bankruptcy insists that he should save his honor—because she loves him imposes privation on herself and him.

The American woman is not stupid. She is clever. But it seems to me that she CARES FOR LITTLE BEYOND HER OWN PERSONAL AFFAIRS. Of course this statement cannot apply to all American women any more than any general statement could. But I have been impressed during my stay in America with the great INDIFFERENCE TO PUBLIC AFFAIRS manifested by your

To be just, however, I believe I should say that this indifference is a NATIONAL rather than a sex quality. It doesn't seem to me that any one in America cares much for politics. At least they don't discuss it as we do at home. JUST BEFORE ELECTIONS, they tell me, every one is interested in politics. But such sporadic interest cannot be called a REAL interest.

Do I think the women of America will have the ballot soon? I am not a prophet, so I cannot answer that question. But I don't see how or why they should have it until they are PREPARED for it. And I don't believe they are.

I DON'T WANT TO BE UNCOMPLIMENTARY; BUT, REALLY, I DON'T BELIEVE THE AVERAGE AMERICAN WOMAN WOULD KNOW WHAT TO DO WITH THE BALLOT IF SHE HAD IT. SHE HAS HAD NO POLITICAL TRAINING WHATEVER, AND, AS I HAVE SAID, SHE DOESN'T CARE FOR PUBLIC AFFAIRS.

But when one makes money simply for the SELFISH exercise of smart things, but by laughing at power it is not only harmful to the money maker, but to the com-

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
