ADVOCATE OF GOOD ROADS.

In the house of representatives Aug. 19, Hon. William P. Borland. of Missouri, said:

"Mr. Speaker-The most important matter now before the people of this country is the subject of good roads. Its importance lies in the direct bearing it has upon the social and ecoeomic welfare of the whole people. It is at the base of the great problem of transportation, that problem which is vital to the interests of all classes-producers, dealers and consumers.

"The rural highway leads from every farm to every market, and over it passes annually the food supplies of the nation. The condition of our rural highways is not the sole concern of the man who lives upon them, but is the concern of all. We should have the finest roads in this country that wise expenditure and trained engineering skill can produce. They will prove a source of
