
COMMENCEMENT TIME RAPIDLY APPROACHING

# OAK RIDGE MAUSOLEUM

To The People of Buchanan:

HE Cemetery Board of Buchanan has granted a franchise to Mr. Worth Hall, of Chicago, for the erection of a magnificent Community Mausoleum in Oak Ridge Cemetery, and have set aside a plot of ground on the highest point in the cemetery for that purpose.


This magnificent building will be constructed of Bedford stone, marble, concrete, steel and bronze and will be furnished with the most complete and modern sanitary equipment known to science. It will contain from 100 to 200 crypts, each crypt designed to accommodate one adult body and each equipped with its individual sanitary system which insures the permanent protection of the body contained therein against decay and disintegration.

The idea of caring for the bodies of our loved ones after death by placing them in magnificent and substantial tombs above ground is as old as history itself. The Pyramids of Egypt, the Tombs of the Kings throughout the East, the famous Temples of Greece and Rome as well as the ancient Cathedrals of Europe are all Mausoleums. The Bible constantly speaks of the tombs in which the body of Christ and the remains of His Disciples were laid to rest. History is full of references to the great men of former times whose bodies were placed within the walls of mighty Mansoleums erected to receive their remains as well as to honor and perpetuate their names. Hitherto Mausoleum entombment has been the privilege only of the rich and powerful, but with the advent of the Community Mausoleum, this sanitary, substantial and permanent way of caring for the dead is placed upon a basis of expense no greater than that of earth burial and in many cases not so great.

RYPTS may be secured by subscription and pictures of the Mausoleum to be erected here may been seen at Lee Brothers Bank. The size of the building will depend upon the number of subscriptions received and the building, when finished, will be turned over to the subscribers, with an Endowment Fund placed in trust for its perpetual care and maintainance. There will be no charges or assessments levied for this purpose, as 5 per cent of the purchase price of the crypts will be set aside for permanent upkeep of the building and grounds. This ensures the Mausoleum against the inevitable neglect and abandonment of the forgotten grave. Many prominent and progressive citizens of

Buchanan and the surrounding country have accompanied Mr. Hall to St. Joseph to view a similar building erected there last year by the same architect and contractor who will design and build the Oak Ridge Mausoleum. Without exception they have expressed themselves as delighted with the building and have voiced the hope that Buchanan might enjoy the advantage of a similar movement. Several of the leading families of this city, after thorough and careful investigation, have already subscribed for spaces in the local structure and many others have announced their intention of doing so at an early date.

Crypts in the Oak Ridge Mausoleum will be allotted when the building is finished, in accordance with the date on which subscriptions for crypts were signed. The first subscriber has first choice, the second, next choice, and so on. Therefore, it is important that all those interested in this modern. humane and sanitary mode of caring for the dead, should subscribe for crypts immediately.
