

MICHIGAN ARMY CAMP MAY COST \$5,000,000

ARMY CAMP AT BATTLE CREEK MUST BE COMPLETED IN THIRTY DAYS; BIG FIRMS DO WORK.

Battle Creek—Ninety days is all the time that will be given contractors to erect a modern city here for the housing of 20,000 Michigan and Wisconsin recruits.

The work will be done by two or three of the largest construction companies in the county, and their profit for each camp will not exceed \$250,000, it is announced at Washington.

All material must be purchased by the contractors at prices laid down by the government and expert auditors will keep a check on cameras will be used to prevent any gouging of the government.

Work on the local cantonment probably will start next month. As yet the site has not been turned over to the government but all speed is being made to secure the transfer of about 100 pieces of land making up the 5,000 acre tract.

P. M. CHIEF TELLS TROUBLES TO STATE

PRESIDENT F. H. ALFRED SAYS FUEL MUST BE CONSERVED OR ALL TRAINS STOP; SHORT-AGE SERIOUS.

Lansing—Shortage of coal and instructions from the Council for National Defense to conserve the fuel supply and increase the capacity of the lines for other things were the principal reasons assigned by President Frank H. Alfred of the Pere Marquette for taking off a number of passenger trains at a hearing before the railroad commission.

President Alfred says the coal situation as regards the Pere Marquette railroad is very serious and he informed the commission that unless service is curtailed and fuel can be stored for winter the road will be unable to operate.

"Operators are short on our contracts upward of 140,000 tons of coal, a portion of which we will never receive," declared president Alfred.

It is necessary for us to economize in every way possible. Industries at Watervliet, Holland, Hart, Zeeland, Muskegon, Ionia and other points are complaining of a shortage of fuel.

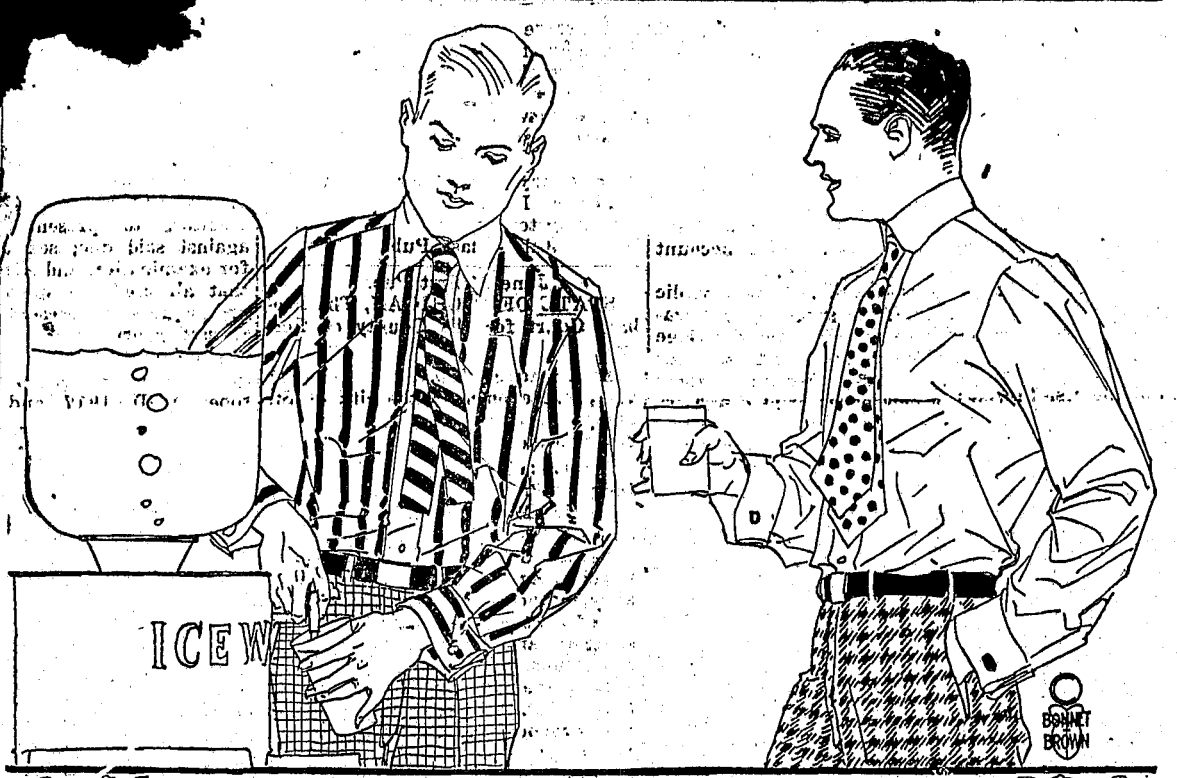

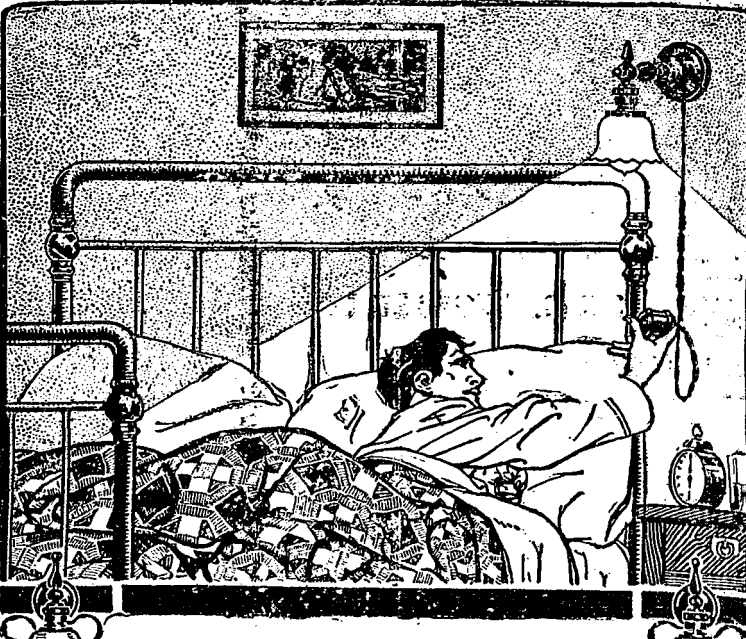

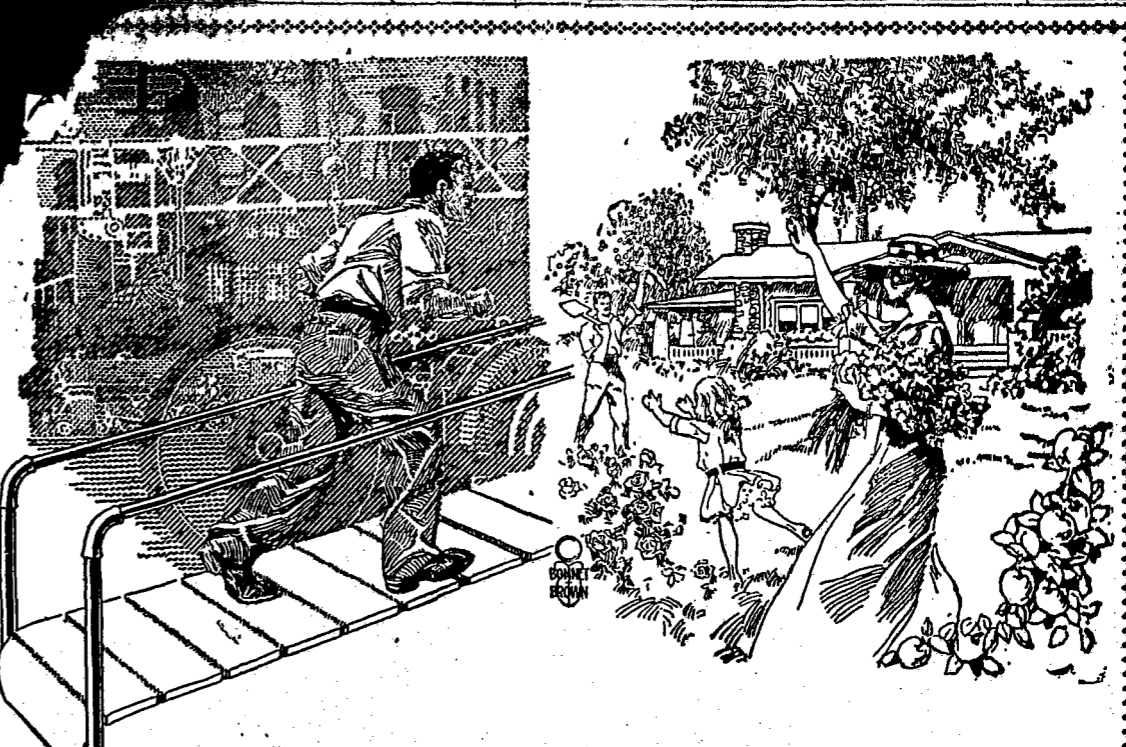

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Special meeting of the village council of Buchanan, Michigan at council chambers, June 12, 1917. Notice of which was given to each trustee. The meeting called to order by President Leiter at 8:00 p. m. Trustees present: Miller, Rehm, Treat, Babeock and Bremer. Absent, Kelling. Meeting was called to inspect the tax roll for the year 1917 and make tax rate for same.

The report of the board of review was read and placed with the Village Assessor, F. W. Howe. Village assessment roll was reviewed and on motion of Trustee Babeock, supported by Trustee Miller, the following resolution was offered:

Resolved: that the village council deems it necessary that there be raised, and does hereby require to be raised by general tax upon the real and personal property in the village of Buchanan liable to taxation therein for the year 1917 the several amounts and for the purposes following:

General Fund Tax: For the purpose of defraying the general expenses and liabilities of the corporation and to carry into effect the power granted said village by law. To constitute the General Fund tax a sum equal to 8-10 of 1 per cent of assessed valuation of property of said village as determined by the village assessor and the Board of Review. That is to say 8-10 of 1 per cent of the sum of \$1,329,760 amounting to \$10,638.08.

Highway Tax: For the purpose of constituting the general highway fund tax, the sum equal to 5-10 of 1 per cent of the aforesaid valuation amounting to the sum of \$6,648.80.

Debt Fund: And for the purposes of paying interest on the bonded indebtedness of the village and for a sinking fund to pay refund water works bonds as they become due, to constitute the interest fund tax. The sum equal to 4-10 of 1 per cent of the aforesaid valuation amounting to the sum of \$5,319.04.

Poll Tax: That the said village council require to be levied and collected from the persons designated in the assessment roll of said village for the year 1917 as subject then to poll tax of \$1.00 amounting to \$404 said \$1.00 to be upon every male between the age of 21 and 50 years, except, however, members of the Fire Department and such other persons as are exempt by general law from payment of such taxes. Roll Call. Trustees Miller, Rehm, Babeock, Treat and Bremer. Resolution was adopted. The certificate of the council to Assessor Howe as prepared by the president and clerk was read as follows:

To Fred Howe, assessor of the village of Buchanan. The village council of the village of Buchanan hereby certifies that Wilson Leiter, village president, and Phil B. Boone, village clerk, be authorized to execute this certificate in their behalf that the foregoing assessment roll to which this certificate is annexed was Fred Howe, Henry Adams and John Dick, as evidence by the certificate signed by them to said roll annexed. That said council at a meeting thereof held in the council chambers, 12th day of June 1917, examined said roll and after having determined by resolution that the following amount of taxes which the said council requires to be raised by General tax for the purposes in said resolution set forth. That is to constitute the General Fund tax 8-10 of 1 per cent the assessed valuation of \$1,329,760, amounting to \$10,638.08, to constitute the general Highway fund tax 5-10 of 1 per cent of aforesaid assessed valuation amounting to \$6,648.80 and to constitute the interest and sinking fund tax 4-10 of 1 per cent, \$5,319.04 and a poll tax amounting to \$404, the said council still further certifies the said roll to be the assessed roll of the village of Buchanan for the year 1917 and that the said village council requires to be raised by general fund tax upon the real and personal property in the village of Buchanan liable to taxation therein for the year 1917 the several amounts and for the purposes above set forth.

Wherefore the village council of the village of Buchanan has caused this certificate to be subscribed hereto in this certificate to be executed this 12th day of June 1917.

THE VILLAGE OF BUCHANAN ORDAINS

Section 1. Prohibitions. No person shall at any time discharge or set off anywhere within the village or have in his possession for such purpose, any toy pistol, toy gun, toy cannon, blank cartridge, firecracker exceeding two inches in length and one quarter of an inch in diameter, torpedo exceeding three-fourths of an inch in diameter, any substance consisting chlorate of potash and sulphur, or any device for exploding such substance by concussion, nor shall any person at any time discharge or set off anywhere within the Village or have in his possession for such purpose fire crackers of any size, or fire works which contain any explosive more powerful than black powder.

Section 2. Discharge permitted, when. No fire-works, fire crackers, torpedos, bombs, squibs, rockets, spin wheels, fire balloon, Roman candles, or other things containing any substance of an explosive nature designed or intended to be used as fire-works shall be discharged or set off within the Village excepting on the Fourth day of July or on the Fifth day of July or on the Fourth shall fall on Sunday; provided however, that displays of fire-works may be given at any time when such display is permitted by the Village Council and when given under the supervision of the person or persons so permitted and at least one representative of the police or fire department of the Village of Buchanan.

Section 3. What not to be sold. No person, firm or corporation shall sell, offer for sale, loan or give away to any retail dealer, consumer, or user located within the Village any toy pistol, toy gun, toy cannon, blank cartridge, fire-cracker exceeding two inches in length and one quarter of an inch in diameter, torpedo exceeding three-fourths of an inch in diameter, any substance consisting of chlorate of potash and sulphur, or device for discharging or exploding such substance by concussion, and no person, firm or corporation shall sell, offer for sale, loan or give away to any retail dealer consumer or user located within the Village, firecrackers of any size, or fireworks which contain any explosive more powerful than black powder.

Section 4. When may be sold. No person, firm or corporation desiring to keep and expose for sale firecrackers or fire-works permitted by this ordinance shall keep or expose for sale for a period longer than fifteen days prior to and including the Fourth day of July or the Fifth day of July when the Fourth shall fall on Sunday.

Section 5. Penalty. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50) and cost of prosecution or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not exceeding sixty (60) days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after the 10th day of June 1910.


