MICHIGAN MAKING STRIDES FORWARD CHECK-ING TUBERCULOSIS

A life insurance company doing an extensive business in Michigan has just published a list of the causes of death in the case of 214 of its policy holders who died in this state during 1916. Tuberculosis comes eighth in the list, only 12 of the 214 deaths becade in fighting the dread disease.

"There was a time when tuberculosis was much further toward the top in Michigan," said an official of the company. But Michigan has been taking rapid strides in the past de-cade in fighting this derad disease. And the work there has been done by the state anti-tuberculosis association, by the local societies and by all the organizations that are fighting tuberculosis is beginning to count.

"Life insurance statistics are retty reliable indication of real conlitions. It is sometimes hard for the people of a state or any comunity to see the results of movements such as are being conducted against tuberculoiss, but such things as insurance statistics show that work of this kind counts. 


