Buchanan is to have a new post office building. This has been pre-dicted and recognized as a necessity for some time and now the anticipation is to become a reality.

A party of local men, cognizant of the city's need, which is growing daily with its expansion of industrial life, got together last Thursday and decided to erect a suitable building, probably one story in height. The plans are ready and have been submitted to several contractors. It is understood that these plans

have been submitted to representatives of the postoffice department who have found them acceptable and have acquiesed in the plan.

The site selected and purchased is Frown as the Burch property, lying on East Front street just east of the

old Buchanan garage. The building will be 20x70 fea inside measurement, the front to be a modern one of plate glass and brick and the sides and rear walls will be of concrete. The interior plans call for a lobby of ample size, writing desks, and a new outfit of call and lock boxes.






