GUARD CALLED TWENTY

STATES BY TOMORROW Washington, July 24 .- National Guard troops of 20 states will be drafted into federal service tomor

This will mark the next step toward mobilizing America's military

The following states are affected: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont. Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, District of Columbia, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Illinois, Montana, Wyoming, Idaho, Washington and Oregon. After being drafted, these troops will be held at their respective local rendezvpus for about two weeks They will be sent to concentration camps at the close of this period.
