FACTS ABOUT OUR LIGHTING SYSTEM

In his talk Tuesday night be_ ore the Chamber of Mayor Harry Brown presented the following information:

It cost the village of Buchanan \$5,812 in the year 1926 for street lighting current, exclusive of wa_ ter pumping power. This amount does not include any maintenance.

The Village of Buchanan paid to the Berrien County Electric company in 1926 a total of \$1200 for the maintenance of the down_ town system, according to the annual statement of last year.

The village pays out approxi. mately \$120 a year to pay a workin in to keep the lighting sys_ tem cleaned and in repair.

The Indiana & Michigan Elec. tric company offers to install, maintain and operate a system at a minimum cost of \$7212,00 a

The village paid over \$7000 for street lighting in 1926.

The underground cables of the present system are disintegrating and according to investigations of the village engineer and the Westinghouse electricians must be replaced within three years at the

Last week an average of two lights a day in the system were broken, at a cost of \$3.25 each.
