## **NEW DAIRY LAW WOULD RAISE MILK STANDARD**

ALSO PROVIDE INCENTIVE FOR PRODUCERS TO OF . FER BETTER PRODUCT

Lansing, Dec. 13.—(UP).—An incentive to Michigan milk pro-ducers to offer a better product to the state, will be incorporated in proposed legislative changes in the Michigan dairy laws that will be presented the 1929 session of the legislature. Changes in the pres-ent laws are being drawn up by T. H. Broughton, director bureau of dairying, state department of agriculture.

Broughton will present the mea-sure to the Michigan Milk Pro-ducers' association; the organization is expected to sponsor the legislation.

The law would propose a grade "A" milk with regulations de-manding a 15 to 30 per cent bet-ter product than ordinary milk. Under present law grade "Å" milk is not defined. Broughton pointed out, and therefore any milk may be offered as grade "A." Under the proposal the top product, which would bring a higher price than ordinary milk, would have to meet considerably higher require-ments including a S<sup>1</sup><sub>2</sub> or 3<sup>1</sup><sub>2</sub> per cent butter fat content and the producers would have to meet higher requirements than pro-ducers of ordinary milk. Another section of the law would

require that unpastentized milk be sold before it is 36 hours old. The same section would require that pasteurized milk be sold within 4S hours. Any artificial method of making

milk appear better than it actual-ly is would be prohibited. Prolucers who homogenise their milk to make the cream line appear lower in the bottle would be liable to prosecution under the act. So far, only one such case has been proved in Michigan.

It would require that milk be kept at least as cool as 60 degrees from the time it comes from the cow until it is sold. All dairy equipment would have to be rterilized with steam, scalding wa-ter or chlorine, and use of iron pipes in milk plants would be pro-hibited.
