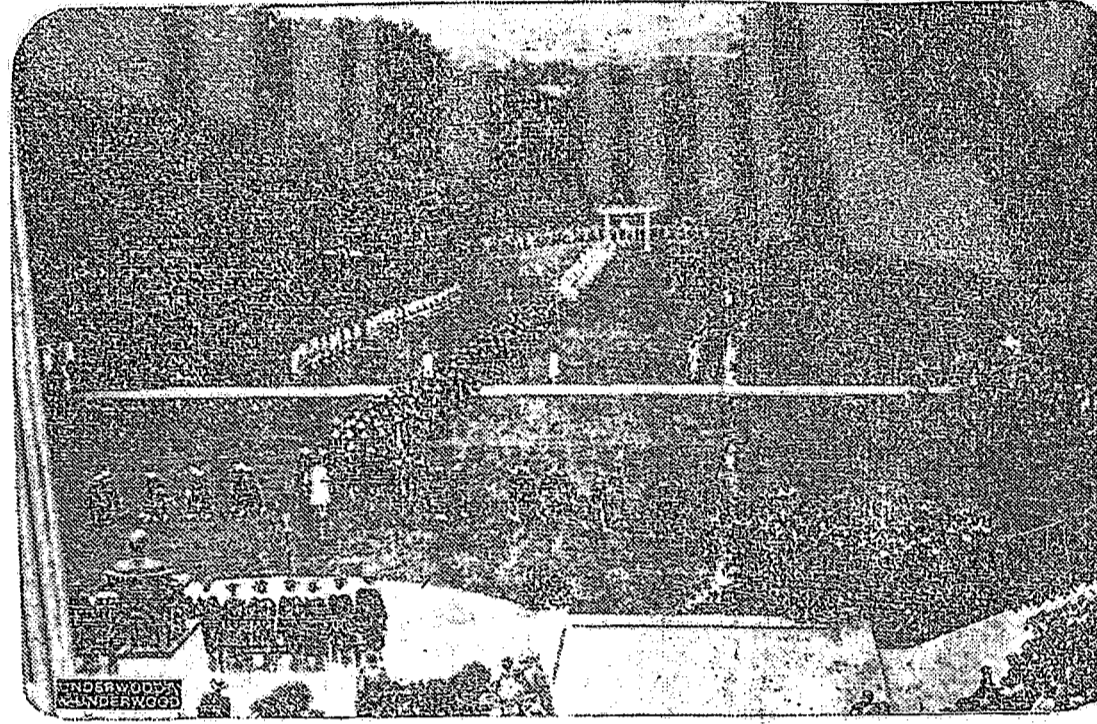

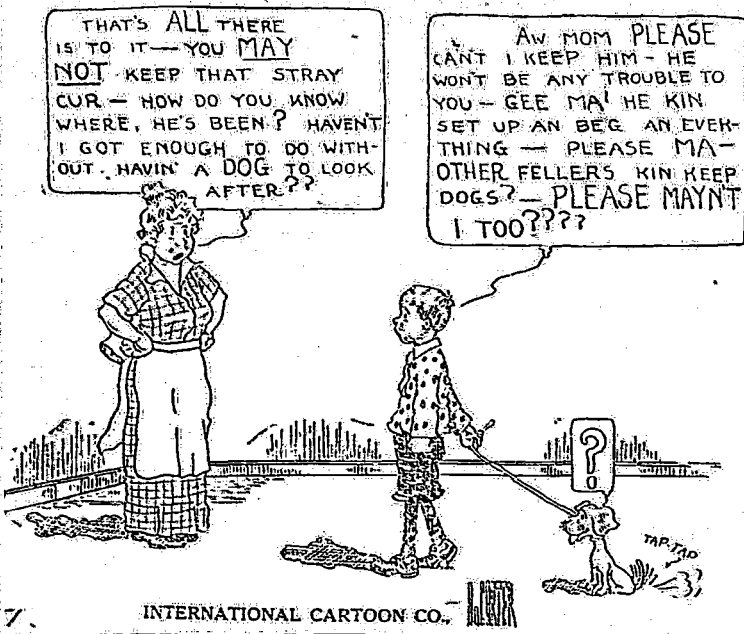
Marvel Best Is Laid at Rest in Galien Cemetery

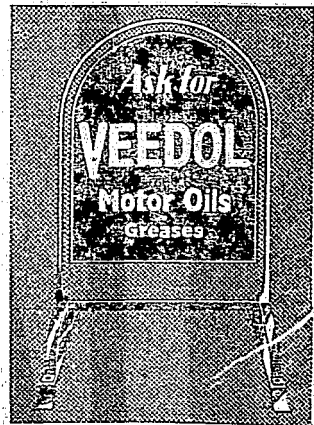

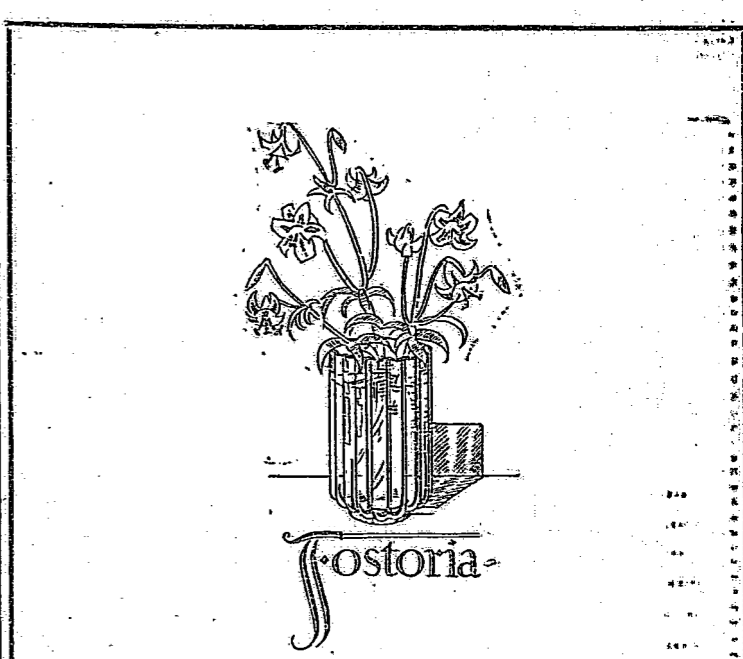

The Old Timer's Corner

Old Timer Tells of Mysteries in Attic of Old Time Farm Home

Now that we have explored the lower floor of the old home, let us take a look into the attic. A narrow stairway leads from one of the bedrooms, up stairs, and we find ourselves in semi-darkness, but after a bit we get so we can see things better, and taking care not to step off the boards, that make a partial floor for the garret, we find some old dust covered boxes, a trunk or two, that had at some time or other been very handsome. I suppose, with leather top and fancy buckles and when we rummage around we find old toys and baby dresses more or less moth-eaten, and bits of ribbon and calico and silks, odds and ends saved by mothers for some strange reason, and like all the rest of us, thinking that some time or other she might need some little thing to trim a hat, or make a "doodle-whack." I find myself doing the same thing, in a way, for in rummaging through a lot of old stuff in my own belongings, I found a lot of things that I had forgotten I had, and that would never be of interest to any one else, so I take a spell of burning up a lot of things now and then.

But in the attic nothing ever was burned or destroyed. As we turn from one thing to another, a strange "gone" feeling comes over us and we remember many, many things that happened in connection with the articles before us.

So we go back to the second floor and look around at the old wooden beds with big high "ticks" on them filled with straw, and maybe a feather bed or two, rag carpets, good old plain furniture, no heat in any of the rooms but plenty of good substantial bedding and plenty of air.

Down stairs we go and out thru the pantry and down cellar. In one corner is the milk room. Then a bin for coal and a pile of potatoes, rows of grape vine in barrels covered with moss, vegetables and pickles and some sauer kraut and a shelf of fruit on a shelf across one side, and a barrel of soft soap.

Up we go again and have a look into the pantry. Find a cookie and start out to look around the yard.

Experts Predict Increased Use of Power Tools

Experience with multiple-row cultivators and the rotary hoe in cutting for crops on the college farm and at demonstrations held in different sections of the state have convinced the agricultural engineering department of Michigan State College that these tools will become increasingly popular.

One of the chief advantages possessed by these implements is their adaptability for cultivating large acreages in a short space of time. A two-row cultivator is rated as able to cover from 15 to 20 acres a day, and the rotary hoe will cultivate from 30 to 40 acres a day when drawn with a tractor.

To keep a crop clean through the use of the rotary hoe, it is necessary to work the ground just as soon as the weeds germinate, according to the agricultural engineering department. If the weeds are allowed to become established, the rotary hoe does not destroy them as effectively as when used earlier.

Successful work was performed with two-row cultivators in a demonstration held in Monroe county. The cultivators were pulled by tractors at speeds which varied from one and one-half to five miles per hour. At the high speeds, more of the corn was covered by dirt but the cultivating was well done.

Her son, Randall Couchman, after whom the Three Oaks Legion Post was named, enlisted at South Bend at the beginning of the war, serving as mechanic with Co. E, 19th Field Artillery, Fifth Division. He was killed on a night march by a bomb dropped from an airplane. His parents did not hear of his death until a comrade from Niles returned home.

Fights Mortgage on Ground That Wife Forged His Name

White in the Berrien County Circuit Court Friday. The court ruled that inasmuch as \$3,000 of the \$4,500 borrowed from Betz had been used to pay off another mortgage, and that the wife of the plaintiff, prior to her death, had charge of the joint account and most of the financing, the signature should be considered legal.

Marshke to Face Trial on Homicide Charge

Ernest Marshke, Benton Harbor foundry worker, faces examination Friday, June 20, on charges of manslaughter and negligent homicide, in connection with his part in the traffic accident which resulted in the death of Inez Gilbert, 17-year-old Michigan City high school girl and Fred Schlosser, 23, of LaPorte, Ind., on Sunday, June 8.

It is alleged that Marshke turned his car out of the right traffic lane directly into a car driven by Max Bishop of LaPorte, killing the two above named and injuring five others. Marshke was confined to Mercy hospital with minor injuries until the date of his hearing last Friday. He was then taken to the county jail, being unable to post a bond of \$5,000.

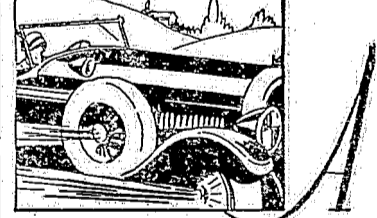

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EPIDEMIC PEAR BLIGHT ATTACKS LOCAL ORCHARDS

YOUNG APPLE TREES MOST AFFECTED; CAUSE IS DAMP WEATHER.

Young apple orchards of the Buchanan district are threatened by an epidemic of "pear-blight," a disease so-called because it was first discovered on the pear tree, but which in reality mainly affects apple trees.

The pear tree does not deserve its reputation as a "host tree" for the blight, according to Arthur Knoblauch of the local Smith-Hughes agriculture department, and the destruction of pear trees as safety measure is unwarranted and without benefit.

The young apple tree is particularly susceptible to its attack, the growth of wood made the previous year being especially liable to the infection. The most effective pest preventative, according to Knoblauch, is to trim the branches back several inches beyond the affected area, and burn all the trimmings.

Its visible effects the blight resembles sun scald. The leaves of the branches affected dry up and a waxy substance exudes from the wood. The branches have the appearance of having been soaked in water.

The disease is most likely to be epidemic in cool damp weather, such as has prevailed recently. A few days of hot dry weather, with the thermometer ranging above 90 degrees, will often exterminate the disease.

Applications For Military Camps Surpass Quota
Compilation of reports received by the war department indicate that applications received to attend the Military Training Camps during 1930, have exceeded the allotted objective of 52,757, by approximately 1,000 applications. On May 31st, 53,649 applications had been received. The number of applications received exceed quota which can be trained by 16,150. All corps areas have exceeded their allotments. The number of applications received on May 31, exceeded the number received on the same date last year by over 5,000.

Stevensville Man Claims Record For Big Strawberries
Fred Bujack, Stevensville, challenges Berrien County fruit growers to meet his record of 27 berries to fill a quart box. He also selected thirty berries to fill a second quart. The fruit is of the Harvest King variety. Bert Sharr of Sodus claims the largest single berry, weight two ounces.

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
