To date only a mile of grading has been done west of the Portage Prairie stone road, and considerable work remains to be done east of that road, especially in the dirt fills at Pike and Dayton Lakes, where the settlement of the dirt was delayed by the dry winter. 
Mad Dog Kills Number Stock at S. Carpenter Farm






