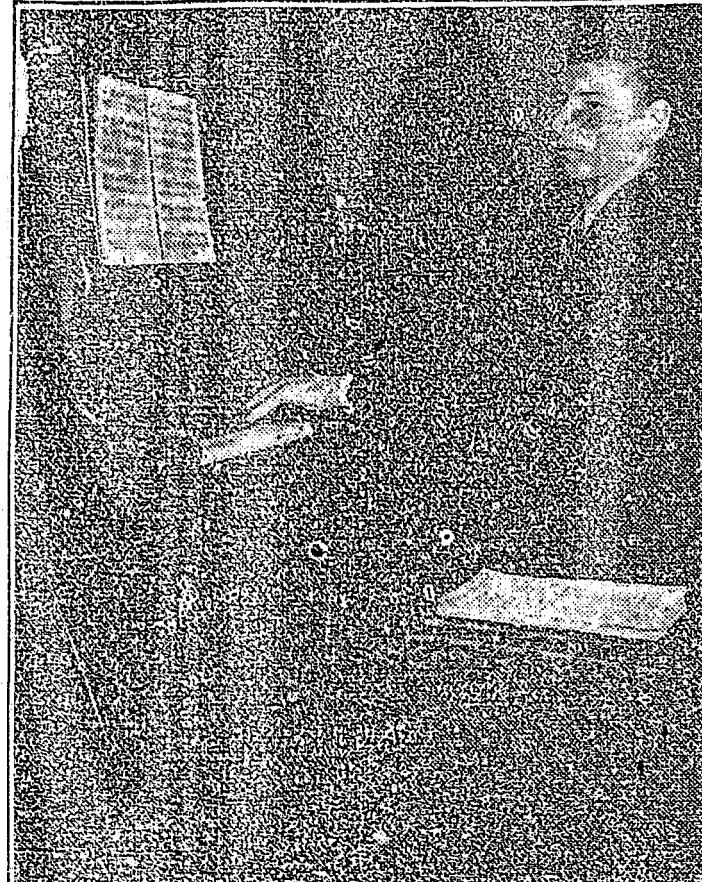

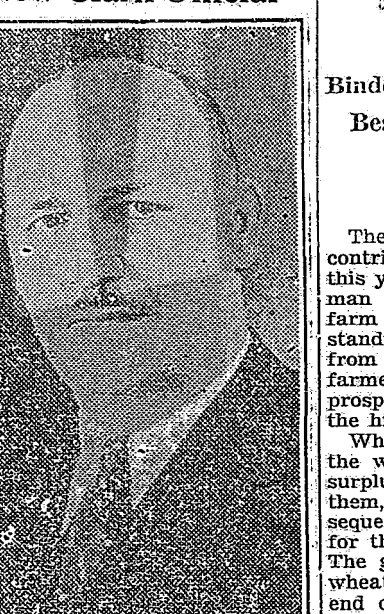
Pollywog School Picnic at Island Park on July 10

Binders Now Cutting One of Best Wheat Crops in History of District.

The Buchanan district will not contribute to any wheat shortage this year, the appeals of ex-Chairman Alexander Legge and his farm board associates notwithstanding, according to reports from the local wheat fields, where farmers have gone into action with prospects of the best returns in the history of the district.

What the farmers did not do in the way of provision of a wheat surplus, the weather man did for them, the past winter and the subsequent weather having been ideal for the growth of a bumper crop.

Practically no crop failures in any line are being reported. Minit in the Glendora and Galien district is in fine condition at the present stage. A heavy hay crop is being harvested and is being sold in the field at \$12 a ton, as compared with \$18 and \$20 in previous years.

Fruit crops are uniformly heavy. Sweet cherries, red and black raspberries, currents and gooseberries are now on the market. Peaches will go on the market about the first week in August, earlier than usual, if the present rate of maturing continues.

\$4000 Spent to Drain Bog and Improve Sanitation of the Grounds.

A camp-fire site in the pool-bed where lazy carp once swam is one of the changes which will first be noted by visitors to Crystal Springs Camp Ground near Dowagiac, this year. The big spring went dry last year and left a marshy bog excellent breeding place for mosquitoes. This has now been drained and filled in and five clear springs provide water in abundance for all who thirst.

The camp for girls from 12 to 15 years inclusive began Sunday, July 5 and continues until the following Sunday afternoon under the direction of Miss Margaret Coghlan of Lansing. Boys of the same ages come to camp as the girls leave. They will be supervised by Rev. F. E. Blawie of Benton Harbor.

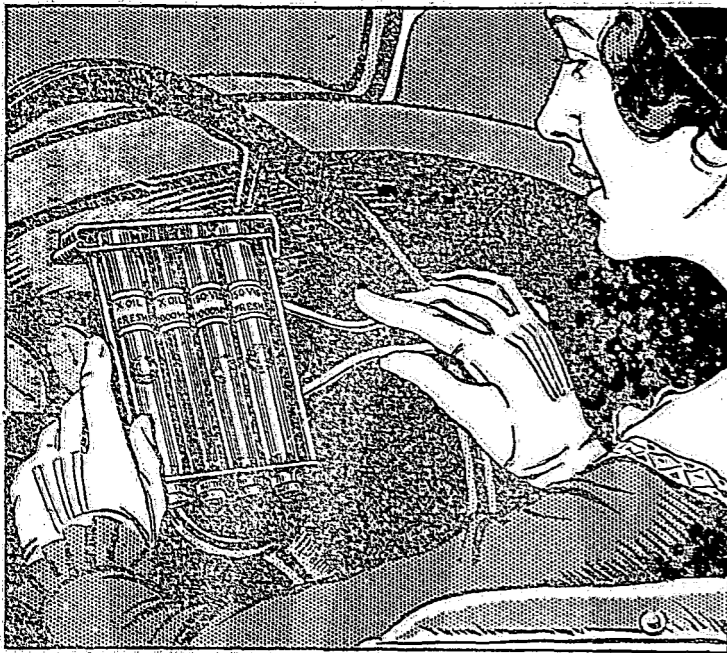

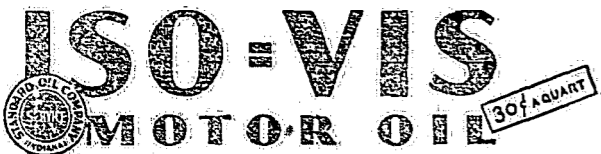

A small land purchase was authorized for the purpose of developing the Platte river trout feeding station in Benzie county.

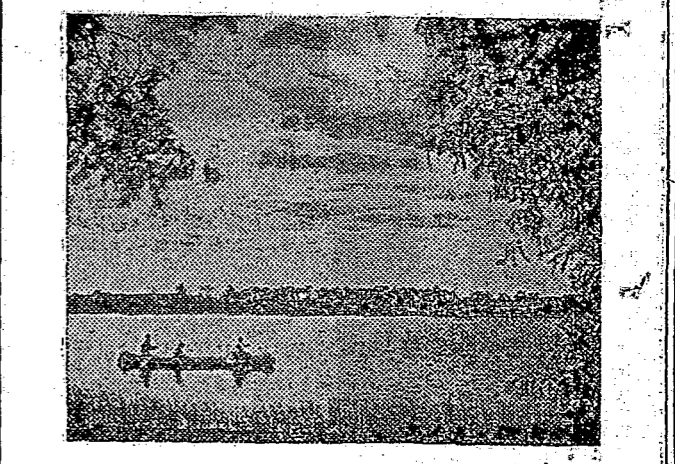

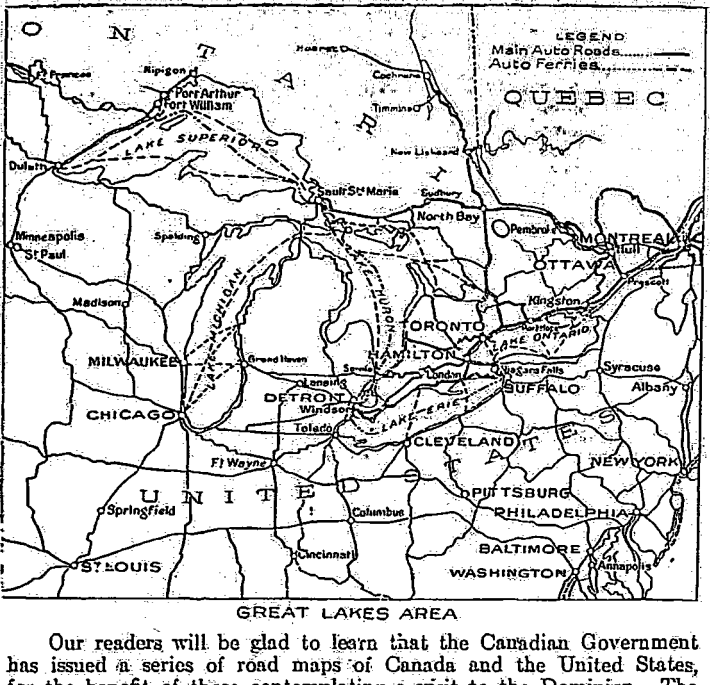
