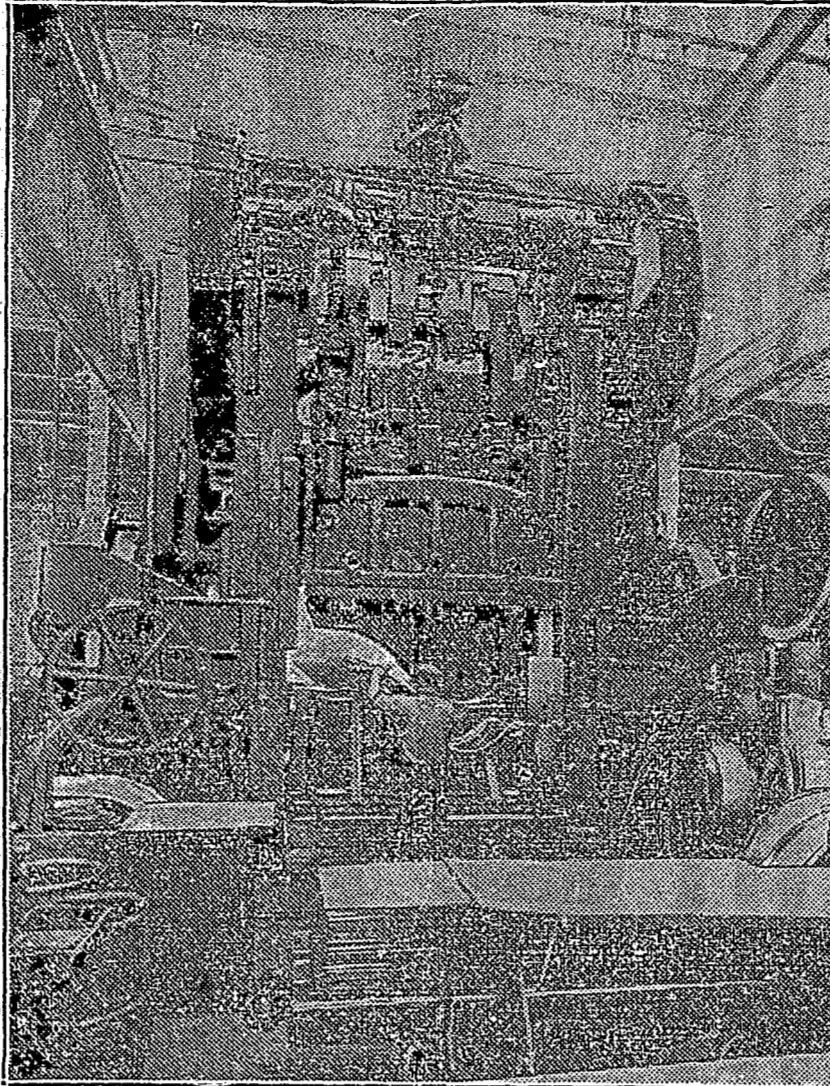

W. C. T. U. NOTES

Someone comments: "If the daily press of the country would publish the facts about conditions as they really are, rather than wet propaganda, for which it apparently receives vast sums of money from the liquor interests, the battle would be won so far as any return of the legalized sale of any kind of intoxicants is concerned." After reading the following would any reasonable person say, "Turn backward, O Time, in thy flight?"

"To get rid of speakeasies, we

must rid ourselves of prohibition" — haven't you heard that statement a hundred times or more? Also, that "prohibition has caused lawlessness?" Yet no less an authority than Evangeline Booth says that before prohibition when there were four saloons "to the block in the Bowersy, there was much bootlegging going on—more than in these days. "Older policemen tell me that the Bowersy and Third Avenue were a veritable mad as a cart from the vice and lawlessness that went on, not only by the gangsters and the tough boys of the neighborhood, but in many families as well." But, now she says, "there are more places of worship on the Bowersy than speakeasies, there are more restaurants and coffee houses. These have become the substitute for the saloons."

The New York Times of August 15, quoting Mr. William Bingham, Jr., managing director of one of the largest life insurance companies in London, England says: "In my recent visit to America, I saw only one man who appeared to have been drinking, on my walk through Harlem the night of my arrival in this country. As a magistrate, I must admit that this man could not have been convicted of drunkenness in any English court. My last visit to Harlem had been two nights before the saloons closed under national prohibition. At that time I found these places filled with people and saw drunkenness everywhere."

In a recent letter to the Christian Science Monitor, Sylvia Metcalf, of Louisiana, a delegate to the Young Republican Conference at Washington, D. C., recently, declared: "The lack of drinking among the four or five hundred young people attending was very noticeable. Here was a made-to-order occasion for flaming youth, so called, to do its worst, especially in regard to liquor. Even at the banquet and dance which closed the conference, as far as I could discover, there was no one there even partially under the influence." Certainly young America in this instance gave real proof of good sense and genuine patriotism, both to party and prohibition.

Crime Wave Isn't the Newest Thing Under the Sun
New York American, April 23, 1911.—(Twenty years ago.) Frank Moss, United States district Attorney says: "As a matter of cold, statistical fact, the present crime wave in New York is a 'kid crime wave.' Not one in ten burglars, hold-up man, or gangster exceeds the age of thirty, or even twenty-five, for that matter. Most of them, perhaps 75 per cent, are under the age of 21. The boys of New York are literally and absolutely running wild. New York is itself responsible, New York's lack of moral stamina, New York's lust for money and contempt for old-fashioned ideas of right and wrong."

Billy Sunday says: "Wets harp on the alleged evils of prohibition for which it is not at all to blame, any more than the ten commandments are to blame for their violation. Wet violations and lawlessness are to blame, nothing else. The wets do the bootlegging and the drinking. It takes two to bootleg, the seller and the buyer. And the citizen who breaks the law with the bootlegger at the rear door has no just complaint if the holdup lawbreaker comes in at the front door."

Abstinence from alcoholic drinks is not a form of self-denial. It is a door to the highest form of personal liberty, self control.

Auto Companies
Go In Production
in Oct. and Nov.

Automobile companies are going to swing into production of their new models for 1932 during October and November according to present indications, based on existing activities in the primary production units of the industry. The tool shops, steel mills, glass, paint and fabric concerns supplying such big consumers as Ford, General Motors, Chrysler and Willys are all getting busy on work contracted for in anticipation of next year's models.

It is now said to be definitely known in trade circles that Ford's new offering for next year, involving many changes in the Model A car, will not be placed on the market before January 1, of next year. The original intention was to bring it out in late October or early November but, it is understood, this plan has been shelved. In the meantime Ford is increasing pay rolls at a lively rate, and in addition to getting ready for the changes in its existing models is also turning out its current product at a pace that indicates sales of the present model are holding up remarkably well.

The Detroit office of Dow, Jones & Company, reports that the new Ford offering will have practically all of the features of modern higher-priced cars, including easy shifting, a quiet second gear, a V shaped radiator, a slanting windshield, shatterproof glass, a full line of colors, even to the wheels not heretofore furnished in any color but black, gas tank at the rear, free-wheeling, and an additional 10 miles an hour of speed. The one point unsettled is the means to eliminate four-cylinder vibration. It is fairly certain that some device other than just rubber engine mountings will be used, but whether the motor will be suspended on its axis or cushioned on a system of springs, is not revealed.

Battle Creek to Hold Centennial

Oct. 3 to Oct. 7

Pioneer days of Michigan way back to 1831 will be re-lived again by citizens of Battle Creek in their forthcoming Centennial celebration, Oct. 3 to 7, inclusive. Elaborate plans have been made for the city's one hundredth birthday party. A historical and educational pageant or procession will be one of the main features of the five-day Centennial program. On Saturday, Oct. 3, a boulder will be dedicated to the memory of Hiram Moore, inventor of the first harvester-combine in 1836. The boulder has been placed at the entrance to the 30 acre field where in July, 1838, Hiram Moore with his strange looking harvester-combine cut and threshed 1-100 bushels of wheat in one day. This field is located one mile north of Okemos, Mich., eight miles southwest of Battle Creek. Saturday afternoon, a state-wide air meet and aircraft show will be

The Centennial pageant, some four miles in length and including more than 100 floats depicting various pioneer scenes, will be held Monday afternoon, Oct. 5. That evening, 200 pioneers of the city and county will be honored at the Sanitarium Union building. Souvenir coins struck in commemoration of the Centennial will be given these old-time residents of Battle Creek and Calhoun county.

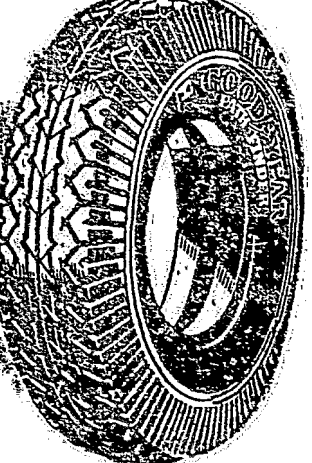

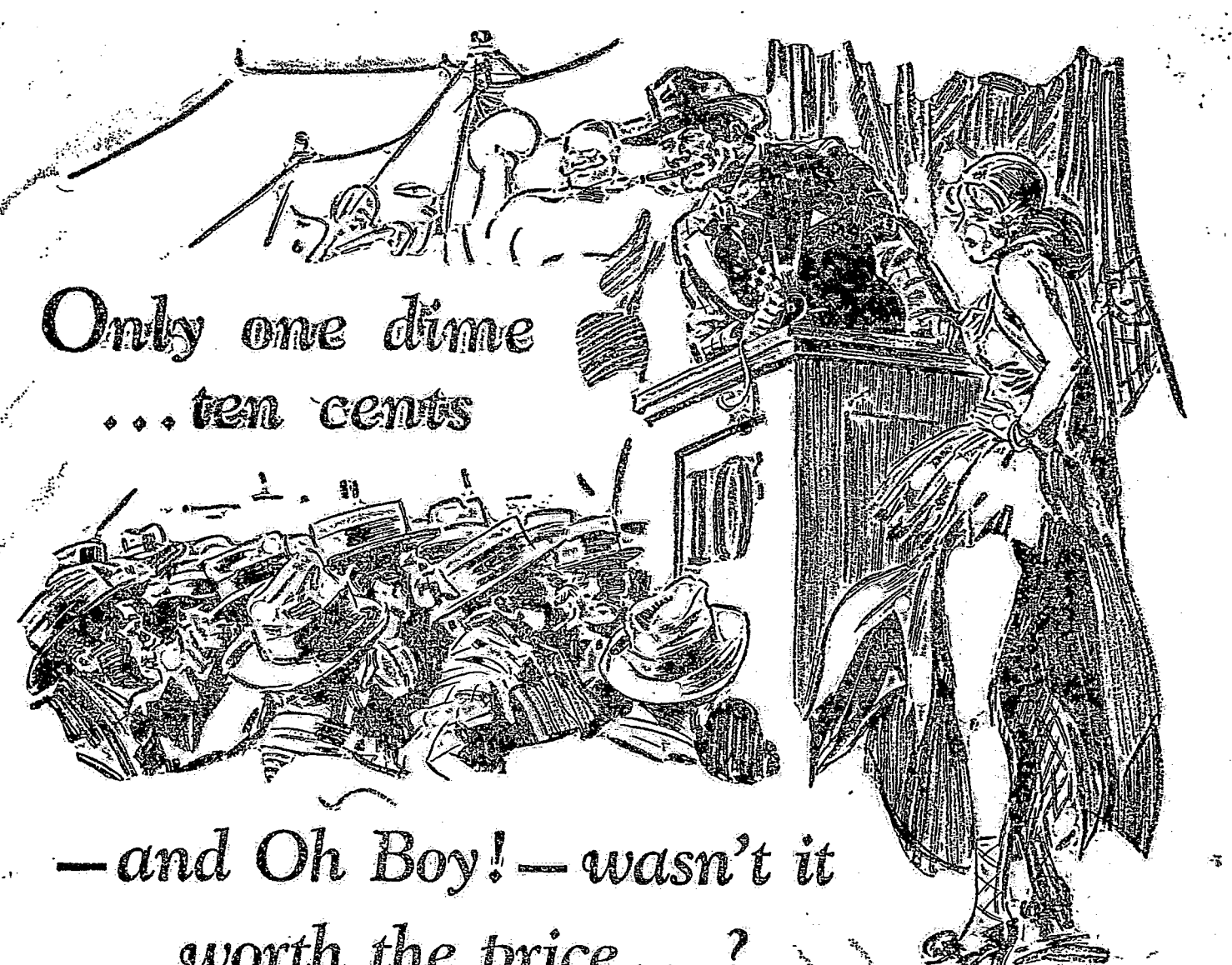
