DALE CHUBB IS VICTIM TRAGIC CRASH SATURDAY

Richard Chubb and Maynard Post Escape with Slight Injuries.

This community was deeply affected in the past week by the tragic death of one of its most popular and promising young men, Dale Chubb, who was killed in an automobile accident on the Range Line road while returning from the Buchanan-Coloma football game Saturday evening.

The accident was to all appearances entirely unavoidable, one of those almost instantaneous occurrences which serve to remind how quickly and unexpectedly tragedy can strike.

As near as can be determined from the accounts of those present, none of whom were able to describe what happened throughout, the main facts were as follows:

The two Chubb brothers, Dale and Richard, were returning from the Coloma football game, the latter driving. Between them in the coupe seat was Maynard Post. At a point on the Range Line, Road, three miles north of Buchanan, and opposite the grove on the west side of the road on the H. J. Postlewaite farm, a cow which Carl Mitchell and Jimmie Postlewaite were leading along the fence became frightened at the lights and bolted out into the road in the course of the car, dragging Mitchell at the end of a rope. Richard Chubb saw the cow start across the road and veered to the left in an effort to go around it. However, the animal reached the left side of the pavement simultaneously with the car. The left side of the car struck the animal, throwing it into the air and back into the road, while the machine, according to Mitchell and Postlewaite, seemingly pivoted on its front wheels with the impact of the collision and the rear end described a half circle to the west, and it rolled over once sideways and alighted on its wheels in the ditch, facing north and with the right wheel up on the bank.

Mitchell was still hanging to the rope with both feet, braced when the car struck. As the car landed he saw Dale Chubb lying near a detached door just off the pavement and a dozen feet in front of the car in its reversed position. Postlewaite picked up Maynard Post, who was thrown about the same distance to the rear of the car. No one knows whether Richard Chubb was thrown clear or not, not even himself. He suffered only bruises and shock. Post suffered from shock and incurred bruises and cuts over the right eye and on the right hand, each of which required several stitches.

R. S. Russell of Buchanan was following in the wake of the Chubb car with a load of young people who had been at the game. He was the first to arrive at the scene and went to Dale Chubb's assistance. With the aid of others he loaded the injured youth in his car and James Ellis had him in the seat while he was rushed to Buchanan. The car was stopped on Main Street opposite the office of Dr. Strayer, who came immediately and after a brief examination pronounced the youth dead. It is believed that he lived until his arrival in town but was never conscious after the collision. He had apparently been caught by the car as it turned over, the left side of his skull or the right side of his chest being crushed and several ribs having penetrated the lung.

He was born in Buchanan, Oct. 20, 1908, the son of James Morrow Chubb. His mother died in 1919. In addition to his father he is survived by one brother, Richard Chubb. He was a star halfback on the independent Oriole football team, and had been a leader during his student days at the local high school, an account of which is printed on the Microphone page.

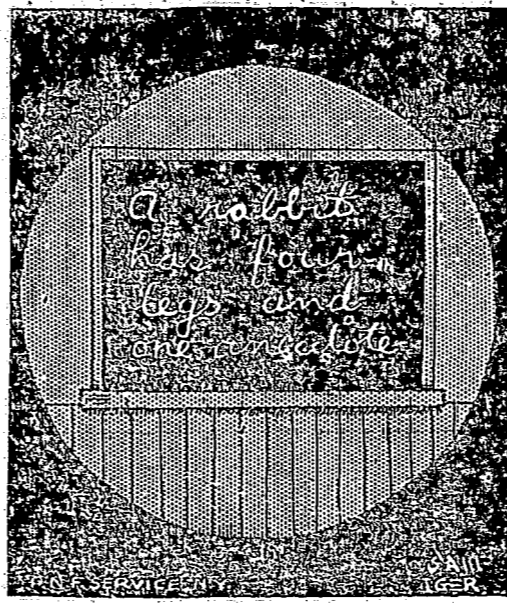
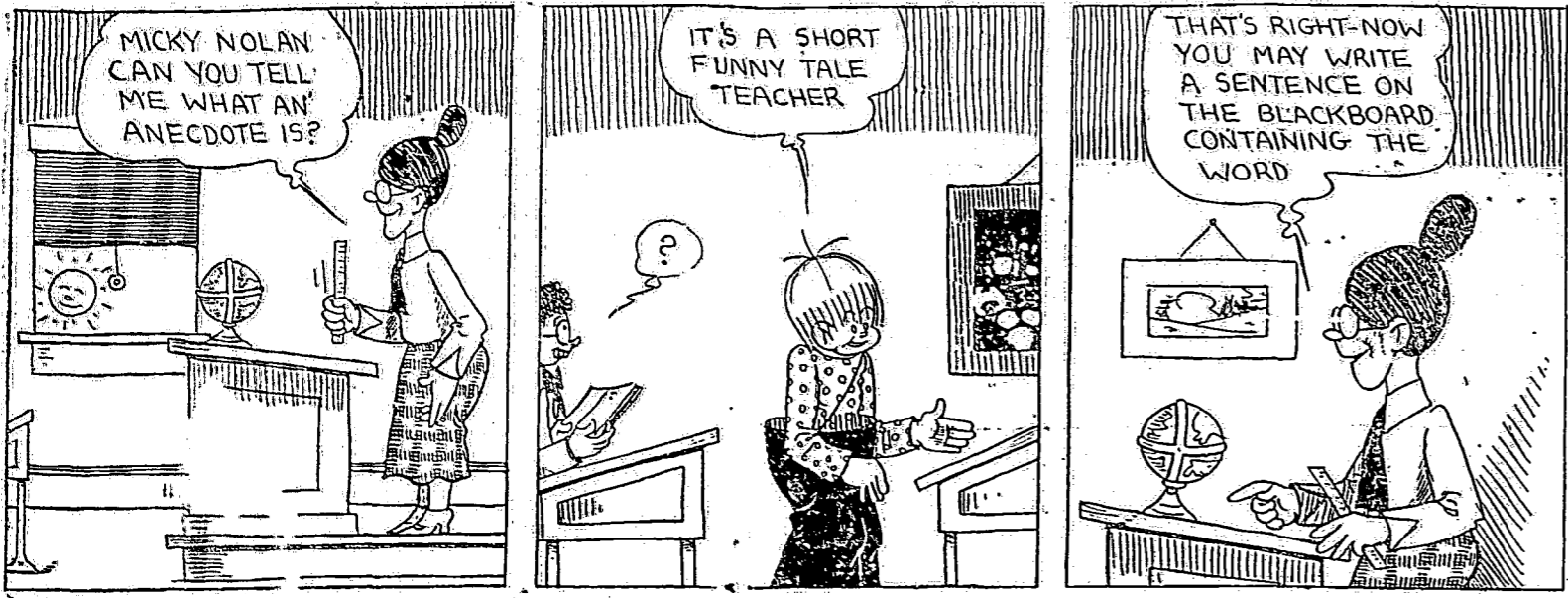

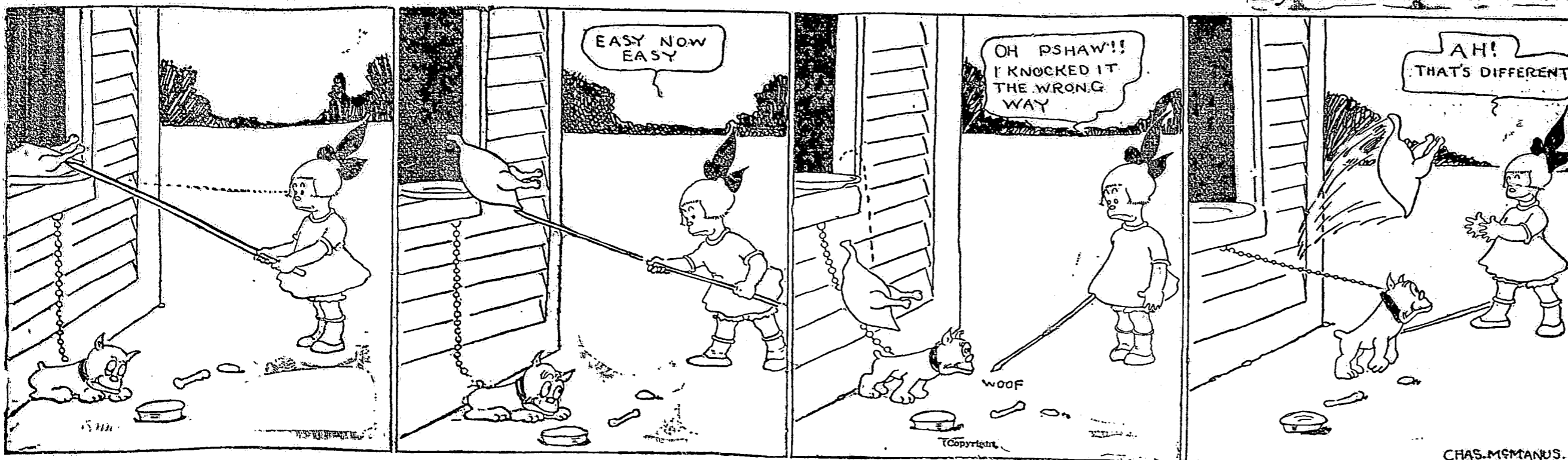
