W. C. T. U. NOTES

The W. C. T. U. enjoyed a very pleasant afternoon at the home of Ray and Mrs. W. F. Boettcher on Friday afternoon, Jan. 29. The devotionals were in charge of Mrs. W. F. Runner, who was the leader for the day. She gave a very unique, as well as inspirational exposition of Romans, 12th chapter, comparing it to Paul's getting the Romans ready to have their piccollo taken, and that everything about their character must be perfect, or it would show thru and spoil the picture.
The special music was a duet entitled "Beautiful Home," beautifully rendered by Rev. and Mrs. Boettcher, with Mrs. Boettcher at the piano.

Roll call was answered by each member present naming something they would try to do during the coming year, in the line of our work.
After the business, Mrs. Runner again took the floor, and gave a very informing and heartening paper entitled, "What is the Outlook for the New Year, 1932?" which we give as follows:

There probably has never been a time in the history of the people living today, when this question has been and is being asked more often than in this present year.
It is a question that is apt to be asked at the beginning of each new year. However, we believe the long continued depression has caused it to be pressed home to each individual as never before. Not only as individuals must we recognize it, but also in connection with our families, churches and various organizations existent in every community and state; and even leading up to and including our president and seat of government in Washington—all are confronted with the question, "What is the outlook for 1932?"
A depression has a way of its own in manufacturing such statements as "all is lost," "I have nothing left," or "all is gone," "nothing is left," if this were really true then the situation would be deplorably hopeless.
In connection with this phase of the effects of the depression, we are reminded of the words of Dr. Frederick Shannon, of Chicago when recently in a sermon, he spoke on the depression, and in answer to the question, "What is there left?" he said, "Well, God is left, and you are left!"

The two great factors of creation—the one the creator, the other the one for whom all things were created! Considered in the light of this knowledge, we should rather feel that nothing is lost, and all is left. Through all the ages it has been proven that when God and man worked harmoniously together, great things for good were accomplished.
Then, what is wrong? Have we so widely separated ourselves from God that we imagined ourselves in charge of affairs, and just now are working up to the fact that the task is too big for us, and that we have lost control? It would appear so. We seem to have been pushed into the position of standing helplessly by and viewing the

wreckage—which offers only the mockery of consolation produced by such a condition. Then, may we ask, "What, if any, is the remedy?"
We believe this question can be answered best in this way—"Back to God and a uniting of our energy, our efforts and our influence to harmonize with God's plan." We recently heard a minister over the radio refer to prayer, as "The Unused Power of the Church." What a tragedy that the one fundamental principle—the real source of power upon which the life of the church is dependent, should be so neglected!
We believe this is not an exaggerated statement. Neither does it mean that there are not many earnest praying people in the world today. Yes, there are many millions of them, but there should be millions more. We have all heard the statement that "more is accomplished through prayer than the world dreams of." We thoroughly believe this to be a fact. Haven't we all, each of us, seen its truthfulness verified in our own experiences? In fact all that has been accomplished in the way of overcoming the evil in the world, has been done through the faith and prayer and works of God's children.

What is the outlook for the temperance cause in this new year? What are the encouraging features so far? Let us take a peep through national headquarters at Washington. First we find one of the greatest victories for the cause which was won Thursday, Jan. 21, when Senator Bingham of Connecticut, presented the first wet measure to the senate for action. This he did in opposition to advice from his best friends. He explained we wanted the status of the senate, so forced the bill, and the senate answered by a vote of 55 to 15 against it—the remaining 26 senators, representing 13 states "paired off"—one for and one against, making the vote to stand 68 to 20 against it if all had voted! This is four more than a 2-3 vote. He expected a hopeful result. Second, in the same announcements came the statements that Rascoe had no influence favorable to pull the wets to victory. And thirdly that Al Smith declared there was no use in trying to change the 18th amendment—as to try to oust it he said, "It just couldn't be done."

We really never expected to get such an admission from Al Smith but here it is—broadcast all over the land right at the beginning of the new year, and at a time when the wets are supposed to have all their paraphernalia ready—bright and shiny, and all their forces lined up for the big battle they are planning for this year. Of course this may not be a criterion for developments for the remainder of the year, but it is significant that such decisive, quick, seemingly easy and important action against the wets should come so early in the year. And what of our national W. C. T. U. work? Our national leaders are not "sleeping on the job" any of the time. We take great courage when we think of such women as our own Mrs. Boole—and we can rest assured that our cause could not be in safer hands. And then we come down to our own local work. We have much to encourage us—much to be thankful for in having interested, loyal members. Yes, they are few, and we wish there were many more; but we are "carrying on" and trying to do our best—

and (in the language of Andy) "That is something." My own opinion is that we should not undertake any new lines of work just now, at least not if it involves much expense. Rather, I would advise that we apply ourselves more actively to the work already in hand, and especially push the school contest work or essay department.
Outside of that to just "keep on keeping on" in our quiet, sweet inoffensive manner, and to just remember that our work is fruitful for God because we exercise the spirit of Christ in all our work.
Let us "not be weary in well doing."
After the program the meeting adjourned to meet next month at the home of Mrs. Will Rough, 206 Clark street, with Mrs. M. L. Mills as leader. Her topic will be "February, Birthdays of Many Famous People."
