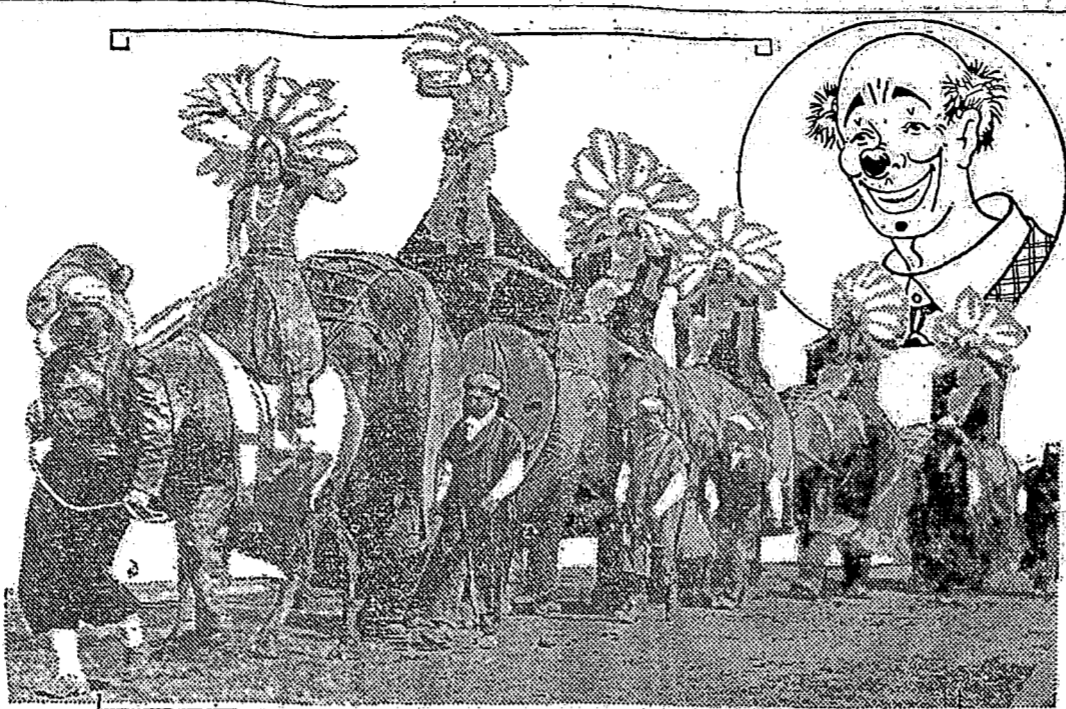
Seniors Scarce On Skip Day

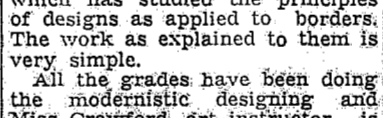
All the grades have been doing some of this work except the first which has studied the principles of designs as applied to borders. The work as explained to them is very simple.
