STATE BANK WILL REPAY MOST OF DEPOSITORS MONEY. The growing spirit of hope deriving from the signs of lifting clouds on the general economic horizon was augmented in Buchanan this past week by the tidings that the Buchanan State bank was about due to pay its first dividend and by further assurance that the state of the affairs in that institution is hardly so dark as has been painted.

In the first place, according to Harry Boyce, the receivership does not constitute a drain on the depositors' money, as is quite generally believed, but on the contrary the institution has been paying a fair margin of profit in the hands of the receivership. Sources of income from which this profit has been derived are: interest from notes and mortgages, bond coupons, rental from bank building and from safety deposit boxes.

After scaling down the assets of the bank to a reasonable degree, and making allowances for bond defalcations, non-payment of notes and other loss of assets, the Buchanan State Bank should eventually pay out considerable more than a majority of the depositors' money, according to Receiver Boyce. The extent to which the depositors will be paid depends, of course, on future economic conditions. If returning normalcy should sufficiently improve—the status of the bond market, and the general ability of the debtors of the bank to pay their obligations, the institution would be able to pay out almost in full.

RECEIVERSHIP SHOWS PROFIT, STATES BOYCE

Dividend Paid Entirely From Receipts of Liquidation; More Dividends to Follow Says Receiver.

Checks are being released this morning by Harry Boyce, receiver, to the commercial and savings depositors of the erstwhile Buchanan State Bank, representing their individual share of a 10 per cent dividend totaling \$29,523.64.

Receiver Boyce states that this first dividend comes entirely from the proceeds of the regular dividend liquidation of the bank's assets, and that the decision not to borrow funds to augment this dividend was reached after careful and thorough consideration. Mr. Boyce states that additional dividends will be distributed from time to time as quickly as collections make them possible.

Contrary to the general impression, Boyce states, the receivership shows a considerable margin of profits over and above all expenses since the bank closed, and that in his belief it will continue to do so. This dividend comes at a timely aid for the payment of city taxes. The petition and order authorizing the issue of the 10 per cent dividend was signed Friday by Judge Charles E. White. The petition had been filed by the firm of Burns and Hadsell of Niles, representing the receiver.

The order stipulates that the money be paid within ten days after receipt from the state treasurer. Receiver Boyce states that the checks will be issued at the bank and that it is important that all depositors call as soon as possible.

Baroda Dividend Thursday, July 28, the court signed an order authorizing the payment of a 10 per cent dividend to the depositors of the Baroda State Bank, the dividend totalling approximately \$22,000. The same day the state banking commissioner filed a petition asking that plans for the reorganization of the Benton Harbor State Bank be approved and the receivership terminated.

Although she had always lived in Milwaukee, she was well known here through her frequent visits with relatives here. Mr. and Mrs. Ben Davis left Tuesday for Milwaukee to attend the funeral, which is to be held today.

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G. H. STEVENSON DIED SUDDENLY MON. MORNING

Former City Engineer Lafayette, Ind.; Veteran Spanish-American Wars; Ill Only Day.

George Henry Stevenson, 59, died suddenly at his home at 308 West Fourth Street at 1:40 a. m. Monday, after an illness of only a day.

Stevenson had made his home in Buchanan for fifteen years, and was employed at the Clark Equipment plant as time keeper for the foundry at the time of his death. A quiet and retired man, he was universally respected by those who knew him.

He was born Sept. 24, 1872, at Greencastle, Ind., the son of Thomas Henry and Seolida Stevenson. He married Jeannette Gladis Ruby on June 15, 1901. He came to this section first in 1910, living first at Bakertown. With the exception of a five year interim spent in Gary the family has made this place their home since.

He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War, having served with Company A, Second Infantry. He attended Purdue university, where he was educated in the civil engineering profession and he served for a time as county surveyor of Tippecanoe County, Ind., and also as city engineer of Lafayette, Ind. During the latter period of service he laid out many of the streets of that city and of neighboring towns. He was a Past Grand Master of the Masonic Lodge of Lafayette, Ind., and a member of the Knight Templar lodge. He was a member and an elder of the local Presbyterian church.

He served at one time as physical director in the Y. M. C. A. at Lafayette, Ind. He had been in ill health for several years, but was acutely ill only a day. The funeral was held at 10 a. m. yesterday from the home, Rev. H. W. Staver preaching the funeral service. The body was taken to Lafayette, Ind., the same afternoon for burial in the Springvale Cemetery, the committal service being read by Rev. Dr. Graham, of the First Presbyterian church of that city.

2 BANDITS HOLD UP STANDARD OIL YESTERDAY MORN

Rob Attendant of Cash at Gun Point; Depart via Days Avenue in Oldsmobile.

Buchanan had the experience of a daylight robbery about 11:40 a. m. yesterday when two bandits "stuck up" the Standard Oil Station on Days Avenue, taking the funds accessible and departing southward before the goings on had become known to any but Leonard Wood, station attendant.

The two men drove up to the station in a dark blue Oldsmobile coach, carrying Ohio license, and one of them got out, the other remaining at the wheel with the motor running. Calling for five gallons of red gas, the one who had gotten out sauntered into the station.

Wood measured out the gas and then went and checked the oil and water. While he was engaged in the latter operations, the man at the wheel questioned him as to price of tires. Meantime the man inside had kept a running conversation with his partner at the wheel. Wood stepped to the front of the car and measured a tire and then pulled out a catalogue which he carried in his pocket to find the price.

As he did so, the man in the station walked out, stepped suddenly beside Wood and said, as he jammed a Big Bertha into his side: "Never mind, I'll tell you the price—just give me what you have." "Come on, buddy, this stuff is all insured," he urged as Wood hesitated, "Just fork it out over without any fuss and you won't get hurt."

After taking the contents of Wood's money changer and of his pockets as well, the bandit ordered Wood to "just stay where you are and don't make a fuss," and shut the door, walking leisurely to his car and getting in. The car then, without apparent hurry, wheeled about southward and the driver "gave 'er the gas." Wood stated that the man who held him up was apparently about 30 years old, dressed neatly in striped trousers with vest to match and bareheaded. He was of good appearance and smooth manners, and of heavy build. He was apparently quite at ease, and once or twice admonished his companion, who nervously speeded up the gas while he was cleaning out the station to "just hold on and I'll be with you." The attendants would not state the amount of money taken but it is understood that it was well under \$50.

Supervisors Vote to Allocate Entire Weight Tax to Road Bond Obligations.

The Berrien County taxpayer, bowed to the point of bankruptcy beneath the burden of taxation, may be afforded a relief surpassing his wildest imaginations during the coming year in case the plans of the recently organized county road board for the refunding of the county and township road boards are approved by higher powers.

These plans, which are now in the hands of the state debt commission and the state administrative board for their approval, contemplate the refunding of all county and township bonds constituting the great majority of the road obligations, in such manner that the date of maturity will be shaved ahead three years, so that no bonds will mature during the next three years. If that arrangement can be made, according to the road board, it may be possible to meet the current interest and the district bond obligations from the added weight tax receipts, making it possible to nearly obviate all road taxes for that period.

The Board of Supervisors has already decided to allocate the entire receipts of the weight tax to meeting current road bond obligations, in order to reduce to the fullest extent possible the burden of taxation. This decision of the board must be approved, however, by the state administrative board.

New Construction Construction and maintenance costs are being cut to the utmost possible minimum this year, the sole new construction being the Niles-Buchanan road (if and when the approach to the new Bertrand bridge.

The latter project has been awarded to R. C. Atkinson of Niles and constitutes 451 miles of water-bound macadam. The state will pay fifty per cent of the cost of this construction.

Road board officials state that the Michigan Central railway in the construction of the overhead viaduct at the east end of the Niles-Buchanan road, and that the matter is now up for a hearing before the State Public Utilities Commission Sept. 18.

Maintenance The road board has adopted a policy that all maintenance work be done by contract, wherever possible, the county road employees taking care of only routine matters such as patching, small bridge repairs, tilling and drainage.

The maintenance projects which have been or will be contracted this year are: rebuilding Buchanan bridge, cost \$6922; surface treatment of approximately 50 miles of macadam road in county cost \$850 per mile; resurfacing 7 miles of gravel road on the Territorial road and on Meadowbrook avenue, estimated cost \$3,000; repairs on St. Joe river bridge at Napier avenue, cost \$18,000.

Under the terms of the McNitt act of the 1931 legislative session, the county began in 1932 to take over the maintenance of township roads at the rate of twenty per cent yearly. The total mileage of township roads is 701.3, of which 144.3 were taken over by the county this year. Funds for this maintenance are furnished by the state. During the past year the county received \$25,256.62 from the state, of which approximately \$7,000 were spent last winter for brush cutting. The county is paying particular attention to floating the surface of gravelled roads and maintenance work on bridges and culverts.

Bond Total The total of outstanding county, township and district road bonds is approximately \$4,283,800, distributed as follows: county, \$1,949,700; township, \$1,499,448.75; district, \$758,651.25; refunded, \$285,000.

No Maintenance Expense All county roads are being maintained this year without benefit of taxes, through the increased receipts from weight taxes.




