FAULTS IN ABUTMENTS DELAY WORK

Elkhart Bridge Co. Employs All Local Men; Now Excavating for Abutments.
The date of opening of the River street bridge has been set back two and a half weeks at least by the discovery of unexpected faults in the abutments at each end and the structure will in all probability be closed about four weeks from the present date, according to D. H. Mallock, superintendent in charge of construction for the Elkhart Bridge & Iron Company. Excavations at the ends of the structure revealed that the abutments had originally been made of field stone set in loose cement and were in a crumbly condition. They had been covered with dirt so that the condition was not visible until the work began.

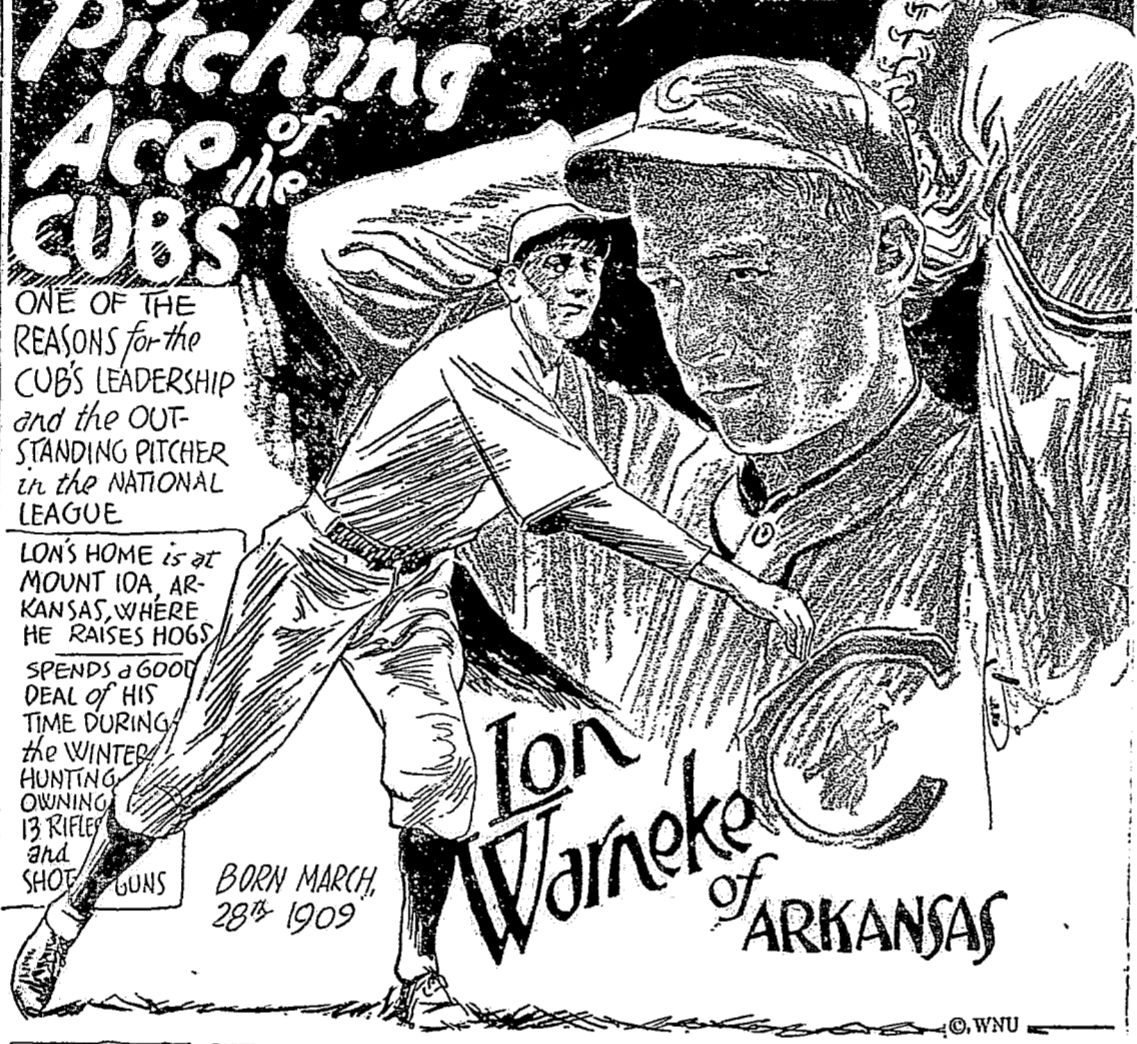
ORIOLES WIN FROM TWIN CITY ACES SUNDAY

OLD CUSTOM OF FOOT WASHING OBSERVED HERE

Church of Brethren Observe Old Dinkard Ceremony Saturday Evening; Love Feast Follows.
The interesting and beautiful custom of the footwashing and love feast commemorative of the last supper of the Disciples was observed last Saturday evening at the Church of the Brethren in Buchanan, this being one of the few churches in this section of the country where the custom is still adhered to. The church of the Brethren is sprung from the old Dinkard Church which maintained the custom into recent times. Over a hundred attended the love feast and foot washing. The tables were lined up lengthwise of the church for the ceremony and the men and women were seated on benches at opposite ends of the church. Before the feast was held, the footwashing was observed. Each man washed the feet of the man next to him on the left and the women followed the same procedure. Each wore an apron which was used for wiping the feet. At the conclusion of this ceremony the company pulled the benches to the tables, where a feast of broken meat and bread and cold water was served. At the conclusion of the love feast, the communion of bread and wine was served. Rev. Grater, Louis Howard and Dewey Rough assisted at the love feast. This custom is held semi-annually in the Buchanan church. The statement recently printed in the county papers to the effect that a Benton Harbor church is the only one this side of the Kentucky mountains to observe the footwashing is erroneous. On Sunday morning a breakfast was served at 8 a. m., following which the regular services were held.

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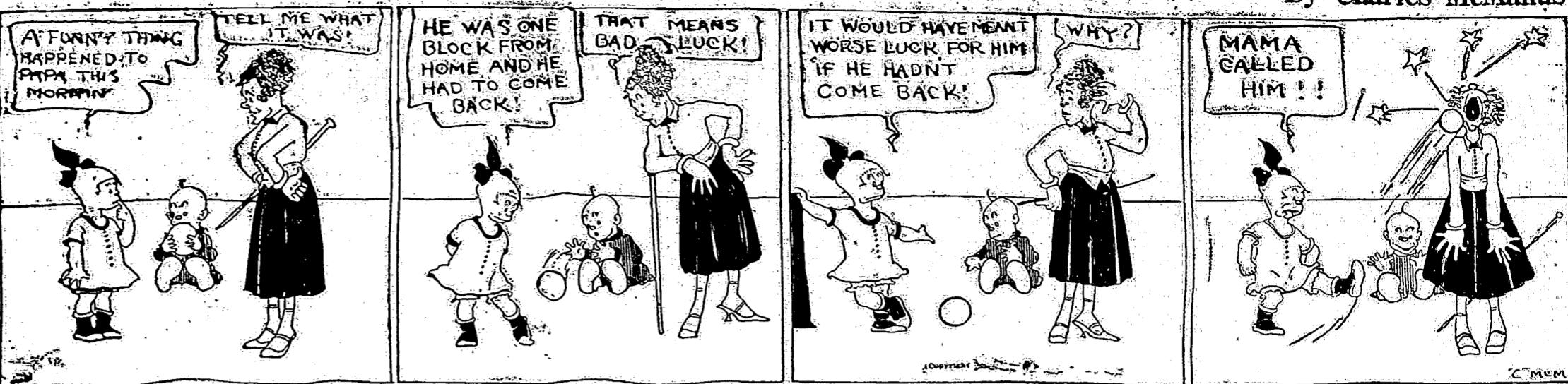
