EFFECTIVE FOR BILLS RENDERED FIRST NEXT MONTH

STATE GRANGE MASTER GIVES ADVICE HOW TO VOTE AMENDMENTS

Advices Voters to List the Amendments and Their Decisions and Take List With Them.

We shall have to vote on the greatest collection of amendments to our State Constitution at the General Election, Nov. 3, this year, that we have probably ever had presented at any one time in the history of the state.

Report of Committee of Michigan Municipal League on Two Amendments

The proposed "1 1/2 per cent limitation amendment" to Article X of the Constitution, by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 21, reads as follows: "The total amount of taxes assessed against property for all purposes in any one year shall not exceed one and one-half per cent of the assessed valuation of said property, except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations heretofore incurred, which sums shall be separately assessed in all cases; provided that this limitation may be increased for a period of not to exceed five years at any one time, to not more than a total of five per cent of the assessed valuation, by a two-thirds vote of the electors of any assessing district, or when provided for by the charter of a municipal corporation; provided further, that this limitation shall not apply to taxes levied in the year 1932."
