



MAGELLAN The Philippine Islands, 6c violet issue of 1906 pictures Ferdinand Magellan, the first person to circle the globe. Magellan was born in Portugal in 1480. He started his bife as a sailor at the age of 15, making trips to India and Moroc-co. He fell into disfavor with King Manual of Portugal over his dealings with the Moors. He then offered his services to Spain and began preparations for his trip to India which eventually took the expedition around the world. This famous voyage was started or Sept. 20, 1519. from Seville, Spain Magellan explored the coast of South America, then his frighten-ed men rose to mutiny, and one ship turned back. He rounded Cape Horn and then took the
