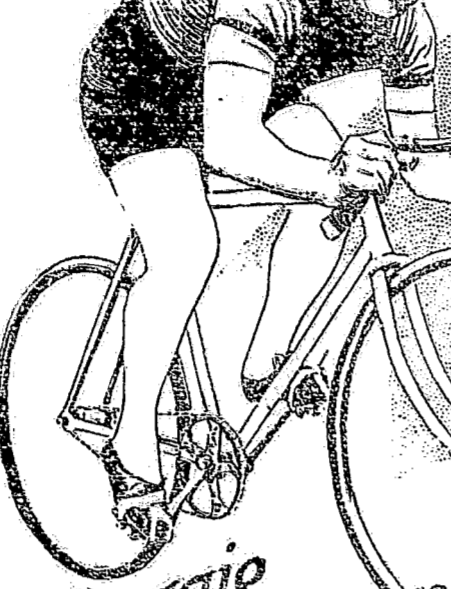

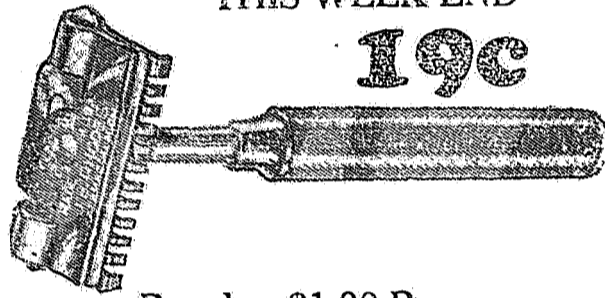

ROUND ABOUT BUCHANAN

BANK MEASURES DEPEND ON PUBLIC ATTITUDE The recent measures taken in Michigan to avoid bank closings and the consequent legislation now under way to give them permanent effect may very well result in an improvement of conditions in the future, in the opinion of a number of local men best fitted to judge the matter.

The legislation now before the 57th Assembly would place banks on a footing similar to that of commercial and industrial enterprises threatened with insolvency. A factory which goes in receivership is not necessarily sold out at scrap prices, but, if the opinion of the receiver favors, it may continue in production.

The theory of the limitation is that as a rule and in normal times most depositors carry a regular balance which they seldom reduce under certain limits. The limitation has the effect of arbitrarily fixing this limit which previously was subject to the determination of the depositor.

DON'T MAKE A POLITICAL FOOTBALL OF RELIEF Much credit must go to the Buchanan Civic Association for its agitation in behalf of getting some returns in work for the money which is being spent in public relief.

The association has performed a community service in focusing public opinion on this problem and in offering a number of suggestions as to how this return might be secured.

WHAT KIND OF A DEMOCRAT ARE YOU? Once a Democrat was a Democrat pure and simple and often more simple than pure.

Mr. O'Conner is a well known hotel manager of Benton Harbor. Whether there is any actual advantage in being an O'Conner Democrat we do not know, never having put up at Mr. O'Conner's hostelry.

Some say that he is the man behind the state administrations. They say that George Welch is the man behind.

It is inferred that if O'Conner is the man behind, then Michigan is due for a very moist future, for the duration of the Democratic regime at least.

Tomorrow the various elements of the party will fight it out at Grand Rapids. And after that we may know more about the truth of the Republican allegations that the state capital for the next two years will be at Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids, or what have you?
