Figures were presented by the representatives of cities and townships that Benton Harbor is caring for 2,800 in addition to 640 veterans; St. Joseph, 980 in addition to 150 veterans; Niles, 2,400; in addition to 424 soldier veterans; Buchanan city, 980.
