BUCHANAN CCC BOYS VISITORS HERE CHRISTMAS

Enlisted Men Enjoy Rugged CCC Routine, Says Herbert Squier; Many Educational and Recreational Opportunities.

Messrs. Herbert Squier, George Northrup and Alva Moss, three CCC boys from Camp Molasses River, Standish, Mich., were visitors at their homes here from Friday until Tuesday, making the trip and return via a truck chartered by a group of Berrien county boys at the camp.

The boys are comfortably lodged in winter barracks, each of which is 120 feet long, 20 feet wide and heated by three stoves each. Here they live and sleep comfortably on army cots, with very little sickness. In fact, Squier reported that he had gained 15 pounds during his stay of three months.

After the first of the year a night school will be started, with instruction in bookkeeping, English, history, physics, elementary mathematics, elementary arithmetic and elementary theory of aviation. The subjects will be taught by CCC boys whose education is more advanced. Several in the camp have attended college. The course in aviation will be taught by one of the men who has had some experience in aviation.

While the camp is in charge of regular army and R. O. T. C. officers, there is no military discipline and very little military drill, according to Squier. The boys have considerable freedom and many privileges, including transportation to towns two nights a week to attend theatres, to which they are admitted at half price. A basketball squad has been organized, composed of four former Highland park high school men, former Uppan Peninsula men, one St. Joseph man and Herbert Squier, of Buchanan. The team won its first game ten days ago from the Camp Harrison team by a score of 25-12. The squad goes ten miles one night a week to practice at Gladwin.

At camp they have tournaments in checkers, ping pong and other games to while away the winter nights. Bed time and "lights out" come at 10 p. m. sharp. The men must be up and dressed for morning reveille at 6 a. m.

Squier said that he works in the office, where he is busy from 7 a. m. to 10 p. m. seven days a week, with only three afternoons off since he arrived there. The other boys are engaged in the regular CCC work of building roads and fire lines through the state forest there. The Molasses River state forest is north of Bay City, and 15 miles west of Standish. The camp is located on State road M161, a dirt road. It is in the hunting section and deer are frequently seen near the camp. The camp has three mascots, a black bear, a duck and a chicken.

Squier stated that the boys in general are well satisfied, although many will not re-enlist in the spring if industry opens up so that regular jobs are available. Any of the enlisted men are permitted to leave if they secure jobs not connected with CWA or other relief work.

E. C. Wonderlich Has Close Escape In Auto Accident

Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Wonderlich narrowly escaped serious injury Saturday when their car skidded and turned over on a curve near the junction of highways 13 and 20 about thirty miles east of South Bend.

They were on their way to spend the holidays with their son, Walter Wonderlich, Cleveland, O., when the accident occurred. Mr. Wonderlich stated that he was not traveling at a high rate of speed and that the curve was not sharp, so that the mishap was unexplainable. As the car skidded from the pavement it struck the soft dirt and then turned over twice, coming to rest on the right side. Several men ran from a filling station nearby and aided both to extricate themselves. Mrs. Wonderlich suffered only slight abrasion and Mr. Wonderlich a painfully strained arm and shoulder. The car, a Hudson coupe, was badly damaged. Worse results were doubtless prevented by the presence of mind of Mr. Wonderlich, who switched off the ignition as he saw the car would turn over. When the car came to a rest the contents of a full gasoline tank were pouring over the motor.

The D's cafe team has some outstanding talent in its ranks, although it has been handicapped by substitutions in its two opening games. If it is entered with the line-up originally advertised it should be heard from.

This marked a spread of 58 degrees since Saturday when all records for warmth were broken with readings of 62 degrees above on shaded thermometers. Readings in the sun were as high as 81 Saturday afternoon.

The Christmas cold snap was accompanied by snow to a depth of six inches. The snow was very light and did not impede automobile traffic.

Mercury readings as low as 8 below zero were reported in Chicago yesterday, with about the same temperature in Detroit. A low mark of 15 below was reported from Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.

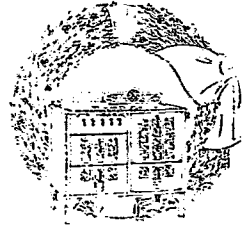

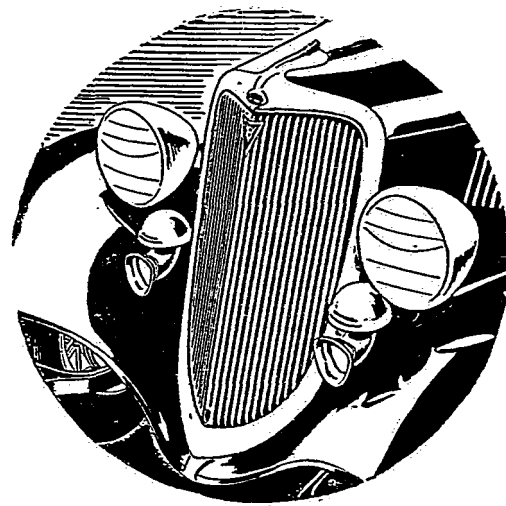

ROUND ABOUT BUCHANAN

CIVIC PATTERNS—WHERE ARE THEY?
The merchants and business men in general in this and every community similarly located have learned that the appeal to "home town loyalty" is no longer of any great force in the retention of business within the borders of the town. They have learned, regardless of the equities of the case, that in the view of the local consumer they are placed on a strictly non-sentimental basis of value received for money paid, and they are learning to compete with that cityward drift of business on that basis.

If the local consumer wishes to buy his clothes in Pittsburgh, his groceries in Santa Fe and read his local news in the columns of a New Orleans paper, that is his privilege and he will take it if he so desires.

But there are other loyalties from which he is not so easily excused. A lapse of interest in the physical well being and in the attractiveness of the town in which he lives can hardly be defended. He can eat food bought in Terre Haute, but he cannot drink the water, or avail himself of the sewerage or send his children to the schools of those cities. The city of Fort Wayne may plan to sell you your clothing but it will not plan your park system, or concern itself about the beauty or the sanitation of your premises. If, by reason of shortsightedness your water is contaminated the resultant mortality will merely make an interesting morsel of news, to which the journals of that city will devote any space which they can spare from the latest details of the current murder.

Which is preliminary to raising the question as to whether the bonds of home loyalties in these latter and necessary respects have not also been weakened with the widening horizons brought by the paved road and the motor. Who, for instance, has the keeping of the patterns to which Buchanan is to conform in future development, or are there any such patterns? This is not a matter which will be cared for by the city administrations, which of necessity work from term to term. It is ordinarily the work of the civic organizations devoted to long-term plans of development and in a position to push them continuously. If there is any organization in this city which has formulated such an organic plan for the future development of the town we have never heard it. What one of the women's clubs sponsors any extensive programs on Buchanan development? What organization has any such long-range plan as, let us say, the Niles Chamber of Commerce prints at the head of its literature? City governments in these days are, of necessity, mainly tax-conserving bodies. But if there exists in the plans of no local body of citizens any systematic plan for the future of the city, just what chance is there of such development?

Which is preliminary to reminding you that if you are interested in good talks over the live topics of the day you will enjoy attending the meetings of the Forum club at the basement of the Methodist church each Friday evening.

Chicago has its Forum club which meets each Sunday afternoon in a large hall at 32 West Randolph street, with world-famous people leading the discussions at each meeting. In Buchanan it is on a smaller scale but as good in its way.
