and every holiday, to gird their trouser bottoms with one of those spring clasps and vault to the saddle of their trusty Wintons of Americans and scorch about the country roads with an expenditure of muscle that would make the flabby young motorist of the present agnast.

They built a bicycle track around the baseball diamond, which was then on the site of the old fair grounds, the present site of the Clark Equipment company plant. This track was a third of a mile in length and on the southeast was a natural shaded amphitheatre on the side of the wooded Niles hill.

The big noise in the cycling game locally was one William House, now of Los Angeles. House was the scratch man in every local, handicap race. Among the buckaroos who used to make him stand right up on the pedals and scorch were George Richards, Fred French, Joe Richards, Clarence Paul, Lee Miller, Bert Lister and others. It is recorded that on July 4, 1897, Will House, Clarence and Alva Paul, Joe Richards, D. W. Gramley, and Marion Harroff rode to Bremen, Ind., on their bicycles, where House won the half mile open race in 1:11 3/4, while Alva Paul won two seconds in the two mile and five-mile handicaps.

There were no concrete roads for the sport then but during the latter years of the vogue there was a movement to secure a bicycle path from Buchanan to St. Joseph and back via Niles, however, the automobile loomed over the horizon and the bicycle became passe as a plaything for children.

PURDUE MAN TALKS ADVANTAGE STATE COASTAL HIGHWAY

Mishawaka Lions in Charge of Initiation of Eight New Candidates; Many Guests Attend.

The development of a chain highway girding the shores of the Great Lakes in the state of Michigan, was the suggestion of Dr. Phillips, of the department of history and economics of Purdue University, in an address before the local Lions club Wednesday evening of last week.

A native of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, and a frequent visitor there, Dr. Phillips paid an eloquent tribute to the beauties of the state which he stated were not apparently appreciated and advertised by its own citizens. Michigan has on its borders, he stated, the largest and most beautiful freshwater lake in the world, Lake Superior. The Pictured Rocks and the vast forests of the wilds of the Upper Peninsula, the forests, dunes and lakes of the Lower Peninsula, he stated, make the state a vacation ground not even second to Florida and California, once its advantages are properly publicized.

The northern sections of Michigan will some time rank as a great winter playground, where city dwellers will taste the undeffiled ozone of the forest and wilderness while enjoying skiing, snowshoeing, skating and other sports of the wintry out-of-doors. The beauty of wintry snows in the fir, spruce and pine country will ultimately be an attraction that will draw thousands of tourists, he stated. Dr. Phillips recommended to the Lions the publication of the scenic glories of the state as a proper project.




Bridgman Enterprise Promotes Formation 8-Team League; Want Buchanan To Enter Nine.



### Scrip for the Journey

By Harry W. Staver

"The Creed of Kindness"

There is a quatrain which runs like this:

"So many gods, so many creeds,  
So many paths that wind and wind,  
While just the art of being kind  
Is all the sad world needs."

I don't think that kindness is all this "sad world" needs, but it certainly needs that tremendously. And it takes the insight of no seer to understand that there would be and could be less pain for men to suffer, less poverty to endure and fewer tears to shed if everyone of us were kinder than we are.

Ruskin, writing in his lecture on "The Religion of Art to Morals," indicates that the lack of kindness is due to a lack of consideration. He says: "It is constantly said that human nature is heartless. Do not believe it. Human nature is kind and generous; but it is narrow and blind; and can only with difficulty conceive anything but what it immediately sees and feels. People would instantly care for others as well as themselves if only they could imagine others as well as themselves. Let a child fall into the river before the roughest man's eyes, and he will usually do what he can to get it out, even at some risk to himself. Let the same man be shown that hundreds of children are dying of fever for want of some sanitary measure which it will cost him trouble to urge and he will make no effort."

Maybe Ruskin is right and the reason for our lack of kindness is because we are "blind and narrow." Maybe we ought to excuse all unkindness on that basis. But somehow the persuasion persists that most of the unkindness would never need to be if we stopped a moment to think. Such blindness can be cured and such narrowness can be done away. And what can be done ought to be done.






