Recall Days When Bill House and George Richards were Star Scorers and Century Club Membership was Youth's Ambition.

The spring vacation bicycle hike made by several young gentlemen of Buchanan, i. e. Dale Lyon, Bill Strayer, Edward and Louis Pascoe, calls to mind that a generation back such jaunts were quite the thing among the young men of sporting blood and a number of such were recorded in the press of the day.

The above named boys worked their way by bicycle over the forty mile stretch to Constantine and return, visiting at the Stears home there. They report that the trip required in the neighborhood of three hours each way. Back in the more or less Gay Nineties the cyclists had to do their stuff on dirt roads under circumstances which would daunt the youth of today. At that they occasionally made their hundred miles a day, which entitled them to membership in the "Century Club."

If there is one thing more than another that is symbolical of the so-called "gay nineties" it is the bicycle and Buchanan in common with all the land had its wheeling craze, when it was the height of the local boys ambition to attain membership in the "Century Club" and the bicycle races were the main features of any open air celebration.

PURDUE MAN TALKS ADVANTAGE STATE COASTAL HIGHWAY

Mishawaka Lions in Charge of Initiation of Eight New Candidates; Many Guests Attend.

The development of a chain highway girding the shores of the Great Lakes in the state of Michigan, was the suggestion of Dr. Phillips, of the department of history and economics of Purdue University, in an address before the local Lions club Wednesday evening of last week.

A native of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, and a frequent visitor there, Dr. Phillips paid an eloquent tribute to the beauties of the state which he stated were not apparently appreciated and advertised by its own citizens. Michigan has on its borders, he stated, the largest and most beautiful freshwater lake in the world, Lake Superior. The Pictured Rocks and the vast forests of the wilds of the Upper Peninsula, the forests, dunes and lakes of the Lower Peninsula, he stated, make the state a vacation ground not even second to Florida and California, once its advantages are properly publicized.

The northern sections of Michigan will some time rank as a great winter playground, where city dwellers will taste the undisturbed ozone of the forest and wilderness while enjoying skiing, snowshoeing, skating and other sports of the wintry out-of-doors. The beauty of wintry snows in the fir, spruce and pine country will ultimately be an attraction that will draw thousands of tourists, he stated. Dr. Phillips recommended to the Lions the publication of the scenic glories of the state as a proper project.

Atty. Philip Landsman introduced his fellow barrister, Atty. A. A. Worthington as the 1934 nominee of the club for honorary membership in a stirring address.

The induction of the eight local candidates was in charge of President Kern and past District Governor Bill French, both of Mishawaka. A large number of guests were present from the Kokomo, Lafayette, Elkhart, Mishawaka and St. Joseph dens.
