Questions are being asked as to the difference between it and other organizations which have been started in the past. For the benefit of those who want information, the following reasons for membership are listed:



Open Street, Lay Main on Front to Rynearson Street

The city commission voted to open an extension of Liberty Avenue from Rynearson through to Front street between the old Clark hospital property and the L. M. Barton property. 
