W. E. Mutchler, 59, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Cecil Ashton, at 6:30 a. m. Wednesday, Dec. 13, and funeral rites were held there at 3 p. m. Dec. 14, with burial in that city.

Mr. Mutchler was born on a farm 6 miles northwest of Buchanan Oct. 26, 1875, the son of Charles and Sarah Mutchler. He grew to manhood here and was educated in the Buchanan schools.

He retired from business about six years ago, and since that time spent his summers at his home at 110 Lake street, Buchanan. He had been in ill health for a number of years, but was acutely ill only four weeks.

He is survived by his widow; by the daughter referred to above; by two sisters, Mrs. Grace Able, Detroit, and Mrs. Lillie Bartness, Buchanan; by one brother, Charles Mutchler, Buchanan; one brother, Rev. Frank Mutchler, died at Des Moines about a year ago.

The Rev. M. Forest Ashbrook, pastor of the First Baptist church and member of the board of education of the Kalamazoo public schools, is resigning from the two positions to go to New York City where he will hold a post of national importance in the Northern Baptist Convention.
