



Aid Offered to Needy Students

Supt. H. C. Stark has been notified that aid in payment of school expenses to the extent of six dollars per month may be available for one or two Buchanan young people belonging to families on relief who might be kept out of school by lack of money for books, clothes or other essential expenses. The number of such scholarships will be based on the relief roll of May 31, 1935, and will amount to 7% of the youth between the ages of 16 and 25 inclusive. Applicants will be required to submit proof of intention and ability to maintain a good grade of scholastic work. If possible work will be arranged for the student in reimbursement for the aid received. Mr. Stark has named as a committee to assist him in the selection Mrs. Fred Moyer, W. C. Hawes and Mrs. Dwan, in charge of relief for this district. The project comes under the head of the National Youth Administration.

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### Text of Will Rogers' Funeral Sermon

"Whatever things are true... whatever things are honest... whatever things are lovely... whatever things are of good report; if there be any virtue and if there be any praise, think on these things"

### Back Stage With Will Rogers

This particular writer did not see fit to comment on the passing of Will Rogers last week.

Millions of words have already been written and we had no particular words to fit the situation. However we picked up a copy of the New York Times published ten days after his death and gathered some new angles which we will pass on.

The Hollywood correspondent of the Times gives the following description of his life "back stage."

Perhaps the most common recollection of those who knew him in the studio will be that of a jovial, talkative man, seated at a corner table of the cafe on the Fox lot, surrounded by friends. During shooting he was always attired in the costume of the play; between pictures he had on his cow boots, overalls, perhaps a sweater or leather jacket. The restaurant, he said, was his club. When he was in town, his time was spent at the studio or at his ranch in the Santa Monica Mountains, some twelve miles away.

He was presented, as fitted his position, with one of the most elaborate bungalows on the Fox lot for his dressing room next door to that of Janet Gaynor and across from Shirley Temple. He never used it. It is a luxurious Mexican style house, surrounded by cactus and desert plants. When the Twentieth Century people took over the studio a few weeks ago, Rogers sent them a wire offering to rent the place to them.

The roadster or coupe that he drove to the studio was his office and dressing room. Every year Henry Ford and Walter Chrysler presented him with a new car. In the rumble seat he kept twelve ties, two suits of clothes and a portable typewriter. This was his theatrical and literary armament. When he was not on the set or in the cafe he was in his car or seated on the running board, typewriter on his lap, pecking out with two fingers the words for 200 newspapers to print the next morning.

He was always on the set at the time specified in his call, never late. He took a copy of the script and read the scene he was to do immediately. Often he changed speeches after conferring with his director. He moved his lips when memorizing or writing new lines—didn't speak aloud, just moved his lips. When he had the action thoroughly in mind, he asked what clothes he was to wear. Then he'd go to his car, pick out a tie, perhaps change his suit, and go back to his script. After the first scene—generally about 9:30—he would yell "Luncheon." His passion for traveling was exceeded only by his love of food. After this first outburst, he worked until noon, reading every available newspaper between talks.

After lunch he often toured the restaurant, chatting with friends, picking up the checks of stenographers, script girls, extras and the others of ordinary salary with whom he passed the time of day. He frequently flopped down at an executive table, but he didn't seem to care to eat in such formal atmosphere. Even at the elaborate luncheons given to visitors, he preferred to drop in later. When on location he invariably took his box lunch with a group of carpenters or extras.


