A heavy drop is recorded in soap from Chicago to attend the high prices, Palmolive, for instance, then sold at 3 hars for 20c on sale. Now and visit a few days with his sis it is frequently sold 6 bars for 25c.

Despite the complaint of current pork prices, lard then sold at a price about the same or slightly higher than now. It was then advertised at 20c per lb., whereas it has been recently advertised at 41c for two pounds. An old and well established brand of bacon then sold for 39c per lb. in the slab and now sells for 35c.

Bread prices ranged about the same, but flour prices are now Gold Medal flour much cheaper. was advertised then at \$1.65 per 241/2 lbs, but at a recent local grocery sale it was advertised at \$1.13 per 241/2 lbs.

The same brand of cheese which then sold for 31c per lb. now sells for 17c. The same brand of ketchup in the same size sold then for 28c now for 20c. Vinegar sold then at 35c per gallon, now for 25c. Navy beans sold 4 lbs. for 25c, now 4 lbs for 19c. Sweet potatoes sold at

5 lb. for 25c. now 4 lbs for 15c. Only a few items range higher Sugar sold about the same or slightly higher. Grape nuts sold about 3c a package lower, but the analogy scarcely holds here as the product has been radically change

The above current quotations do not, of course, take in consideration the sales tax, but even with that added, prices on staples in general use range from 20 to 50% below, omitting meat items.

\$250,00 Back Taxes Paid Approximately a quarter of a illion dollars in delinquent taxwere paid in Berrien during es

August as the result of the state's "Save Your Home" drive. Coun-Treasurer Forrest Brown estimated Tuesday. The payments set a new high record in Berrien. Treasurer Brown said that ap-proximately \$136,000 was paid in on some 3,000 tax receipts made out during the month. In addi-

tion, he estimated there still is around \$100,000 in checks mailed in during the last few days. for which receipts still must be writ-The number of receipts still to be written is estimated at beween 500 and 1,000.

The rush for the payment of taxes was chiefly on the 1932 and prior levies. Property owners were permitted to pay 10 per cent of the 1932 delinquent taxes under the 10 year moratorium act, and save their property from going on the tax sale lists. Deinquent taxes on 'prior years were accepted without penalty or

nterest. Treasurer Brown announced Tuesday that 1933 and 1934 delinquent taxes may be paid from now until October 31 with a per cent collection fee, and with penalties charged only on specal'assessments.


Fire Outstrips Reforestation The American Tree Associaion, through Charles Lathrop Pack, president, tells us that all ree-planting records in the United States for any one year were broken in 1934. In that period 163,000,000 forest trees planted, representing an acreage

of 161,000. "Record planting for states is carried off by New York," says Mr. Pack. "Second place goes to Wisconsin and third to Michigan, with 12,468,500 trees repreenting about 12,000 acres."


Michigan has had better years han this, writes Albert Stoll, jr., in the Detroit News, especially in 1930 when almost 30,000 acres were reforested. But the nation as a whole experienced a record tree-planting year in 1934, due principally to the efforts of the numerous CCC camps established throughout the National For-

est Areas. While the forest-minded conservationists of the nation grateful for any acreage planted n the effort to restore our once abundant and valuable forest growth, we still are far away from making an appreciable gair in restoration as compared with destruction by fire and ax. When our forest plantings begin to equal our annual forest losses we will begin to report a healthy progress. This isn't true today and it won't be until millions o acres are restored to trees each year, instead of thousands.

Last year Michigan, according to the Pack figures, planted 12,-000 acres to trees. But in the
