



James Harmon Ward, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. James H. Ward, who ive at Straybrook farm on the Redbud Trail, eight miles north of Buchanan, will represent the family as a descendant of a famous great grandfather, Commander James Harmon Ward, one of five co-founders of the United States Naval Academy, at exercises attending the observance of the 90th anniversary of that institution at Annapolis, Oct. 10.

Previous to his connection with the infant naval academy, where he served as the first executive officer, Commander Ward was a midshipman on the U.S. frigate "Conof Mr. and Mrs. Ray Miller, fell stitution" from 1827 to 1831. 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
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
