Willard Colvin Killed in Florida

Willard O. Colvin, summer resident at Clear Lake, and a son of the late Edward Colvin, native of Buchanan, who acquired a large fortune in the printing business in Chicago, was killed near Sanford, Fla., Sunday when the car which he was driving crashed into the rear of the truck. Colvin was very well known here and spent the past summer at Clear Lake. He was known by all as Bill. He had lost an arm by a fall under a train while 'hopping freight' in Chicago in a spirit of boyish daring. He was spending this winter at Tampa, Fla., with his wife to whom he had been married twice, first in 1922 and later after a reconciliation following a divorce. He had been left a \$1,000,000 estate by his father, with the arrangement that he would draw the income until he was forty years old, after which he was to receive the principal. He was 35 at the time of his death. He had started to DeLand, Fla., to visit his brother, Richard Colvin, when the accident occurred. His father, Edwin M. Colvin, learned the printing trade as a boy working in the office of the Buchanan Independent, then conducted by Hill over the quarters now occupied by the Glenn Smith store. Later he went to Chicago and was employed by the Hill printing company, in a small shop conducting a catalogue business. Later Hill died and arranged in his will that Colvin and another employee should conduct the business, paying a rental to the widow. Later Colvin bought the business and greatly expanded it, printing the catalogues for the Montgomery Ward mail order firm for many years.

Airport Manager Speaks to Lions

Carl Fites, South Bend, Tells of New Plane Service Coming.

At least one American life insurance company rates airplane travel as twice as safe as automobile by classing its executives who travel by plane as A risks, while those using automobiles are B risks, according to Carl Fites, station manager at the American Airways port at South Bend, who spoke before the Lions Club Wednesday evening.
Poor publicity is responsible for the fear entertained by a large percentage of the public toward air travel, Fites stated. The disaster to an American Airline plane last fall received much press attention, which was not offset by information that this company has from 10 to 12 ships in the air continuously, flying millions of miles monthly without mishap.
Fites spoke especially of the measures taken to insure safety to the greatest possible extent and of the constant study and effort devoted by the plane transport companies to this department. He described the establishment of two-way radio communication between plane and airport, the effect on safety of the de-icers used to keep the edges of the wings free from ice that is a main element in danger in cold weather flying.
He stated that his company planned to have in operation by next spring 20 new Douglas DST planes, rated as the largest land planes used in the United States to date, with many new features of safety and comfort. These planes are mainly for through travel between the largest cities and for cross-continent travel. The planes will accommodate seats for 24 passengers and first day flying and will be complemented by planes of the Pullman sleeper type with berth accommodations for 16. The planes cost \$2,000,000 each. They are equipped with kitchens and with double dressing rooms and separate dressing rooms and toilets for men and women.
Each will carry a crew of four, including two pilots, an automatic gyro pilot and a stewardess. The planes will have a fuel capacity of 1000 gallons of gasoline. The requirement is that each plane on leaving the port must have at least 40 per cent more gas than is necessary to reach the next stop. All employees in any way concerned with the safe and efficient operations of planes must pass rigid requirements which are constantly being made more rigid.
Passage on the new planes will include meals without extra charge. The rates are in some cases less than rail fares plus Pullman.
