The difference between wove and laid paper is due to a screen in the paper making machine which leaves its impression in the finished product. The texture of wove paper is even and when held to the light the effect is uniform except, perhaps, for the dots which transmit the light a little more readily. Nearly all of the paper in use, including this newspaper, is wove paper. When laid paper is held before a light the effect is quite different, for there are found a series of light
