New Contract Offers 21% More Street Lighting at 11% Less Total Cost.

A new 10-year contract for city street lighting to supersede the ten-year contract which has yet two years to run was presented to the city at the May meeting of the City Commission by officials of the Indiana & Michigan Electric company and will be finally acted on at an adjourned meeting to be held Monday, May 11.

The new contract is liberal in its terms, offering 21% additional street lighting service at a decrease of 11% in cost, or an actual decrease in rate of over 30%. The actual saving annually to the city over the contract in effect the past eight years is \$750.84, notwithstanding the large service in-
