Ban The Street Carnival From The Business District The question has been raised in the past week whether the time has not arrived for Buchanan to follow the lead of Niles, Do-

wagiac and a number of other cities of this section in banning from the business section, if not from the city limits that hoary iniquity, the street carnival, with its nondescript attendance of petty racketeers and honky-tonk artists, skilled in separating the sucker from his roll.


A canvass of sentiment both of the business section and of the general public would assure anyone, we believe, that such a ban would have a decided majority behind it. Annually the question of the street carnival comes up, usually with the speci-fic problem in front of holding it in the business district. If a farm festival or a public celebration of any kind is held in Buchanan it must be held down town and the entertainment feature must be a street carnival, say those who think that way. Any consideration of holding it out of the business district is emphatically opposed by the carnival boosters. That would be taking the crowd away from the business houses, with a more or less re-

mote probability that a few less dimes might be spent therein. Since the farm festival of last year a growing opposition has been heard from the merchants themselves, including practically all of the groceries, meat markets, and other retail food sales es-tablishments. Concurring in the opinion are a majority of the professional men, the clothing stores, and even an ice cream par-for or two who assert that the concession booths more than absorb all of the extra business created.

In part as a result of the drouth and the street conditions, and in part on account of dissatisfaction with holding a street garnival in the downtown section, the Buchanan Fall Festival Association has virtually washed its hands of any event this year. They are in favor of a fall festival in which farm and women's handiwork displays have their proper role, but they are not in favor of a fall festival run for the benefit of the carnival rackets. They would skip the event entirely this year and at the same time start now on a real farm event for next year, with the idea of the downtown carnival once for all eliminated. It may be that a farm fair is not a fair without merry-go-rounds and similar rides for the children, but these may be stationed elsewhere than in the business district.

They would go out actively to enlist the co-operation of nearby farm organizations and leaders, whose enlistment would mean that the event would be a real farm event. This might or might not be held out of the business district but at any rate the streets would not be roped off and blocked with a carnival. Such carnival features as might be selected would be stationed in a va-cant lot, and the farm displays proper might be placed in empty store rooms, or even in display windows of business houses. The business men would undoubtedly appreciate a throng on the sidewalks if the streets were not closed and traffic routed so far away that trading became inconvenient.

Here, we believe, is a chance for the city dads to make a more that will meet with a real public appreciation.
