A new chapter was negun in the story of a historic acreage re-cently when Dr. Kenneth Gamble started construction of a home on the old Zimri Moon farm on Moccasin Bluff, which he recently bought.

the most beautiful river views in southwest Michigan, Dr. Gamble's 23 acres is a storied place in the memory of Buchananites. In fact it has a prehistoric record, for on the archeological map of the state published by Dr. Hinsdale of the University of Michigan two Indian mounds are indicated on or about this area. That the existence of these mounds was formerly known here is indicated by the fact that when Dr. Swasey, retired Chicago dentist, organized a racing association here shortly after the turn of the century and

built a track on the Moon farm it was known as the Moccasin Mound driving park. cording to Mr. Rozelle, that they raised one of the tallest poles ever erected for political purposes in Michigan, even if it did not stay raised. Stories differ among the old timers as to why the pole fell, but Mr. Rozelle says the south guy rope loosened. It was a hick-

ory pole and therefore a Democrat pole and whether any Republican in those days was unprincipled enough to loosen that rope is a question on which you might.dif-fer according to party affiliation. But here is the way Mr. Rozelle told it to us. The Democrats made up their minds that they would raise a pole that was a pole, so they took three hickory poles and spliced them together, making a total length of about 215 feet, with each splice made by six steel clamps, bolted tight. They laid this pole along on Days avenue about opposite from the present location

of the Buchanan Coop. Inc., to the Standard Garage. A trench was dug under the butt of the pole so that the end would ease down into the 8 foot hole when it was

straightened up. They raised an 80 foot derrick at the butt, using a smaller derrick to raise it. Three ropes were strung over the top of the tall derrick, and attached to the end of the pole and at two points lower down. Then as many as could lay hold of the ropes strung out north toward Front street, opposite the top of the pole, which pointed south. They hauled it up, and others holding guy ropes to

them. But the ropes over the top of the derrick failed to release automatically as they were supposed to when the pole straightened up and Rozelle went to the top of the derrick to release them Laying on your belly on the cross piece at the top of the 80-foot derrick was sort of a breezy position and you could get a good view all over town. But while he was working at the ropes, Rozelle felt something slip. He felt the derrick going and knew the pole was coming after it. On each side there

were gas pipe braces to the rick, and Rozelle swung out on one of them to get out of the direct line of the pole. As the derrick hit the ground the spring of the pipe
